Message from the Dean



Excellent faculty, staff, students and alumni continue to contribute to the strong reputation the Bagwell College of Education (BCOE) has for educator preparation. Leading all other institutions of higher education in the state of Georgia, we prepare the largest number of elementary school teachers. Equally impressive is our ranking for the preparation of teachers at all grade levels - we are shy of first place by just a handful of students. Education Specialist and the Education Doctorate. Our Ed.D. in Leadership for Learning was the first doctoral program offered at KSU. When benefactors Leland and Clarice Bagwell, longtime educators and long-standing Kennesaw State University friends, made a generous gift to the university, their respect for the field of teacher education was recognized and the college was named the Bagwell College of Education.

Teacher education at KSU is a campuswide effort as reflected through the Professional Teacher Education Unit (PTEU) that I have the honor of leading. Since its inception in 1994, our programs have been developed and delivered in a collaborative manner. Faculty in the BCOE and teacher educators located in four other colleges work together to offer an extensive array of distinctive programs to prepare individuals to work effectively in P-12. The PTEU also organizes and sponsors collaborative faculty development programs related to teacher education and issues of teaching and learning in the schools.

Having completed my first year at Kennesaw State University as dean of the Bagwell College of Education, I now pause to reflect on the remarkable events and successes that have occurred. The selected activities showcased on the pages to follow provide but a small glimpse of who we are and the stellar work that goes on in the college and in our partnership schools located in the northwest region of metropolitan Atlanta.

Kennesaw State University is the school of choice for those who aspire to be P-12 professional educators. Four departments comprising the Bagwell College of Education (BCOE) offer an array of teacher education programs at the baccalaureate, master, education specialist and doctoral levels.

Programs offered include: baccalaureate programs in elementary education and middle grades education; master's programs in biology, chemistry, physics, art, adolescent education, inclusive education, elementary education and educational leadership; the doctoral program for the preparation of teacher leaders; and non-degree programs that qualify educators for additional certification fields in ESOL, reading and educational leadership. These programs account for more than two-thirds of the total enrollment in all of KSU's educator preparation programs. Together with educator preparation programs in four other KSU colleges, total enrollment across all programs in the Professional Teacher Education Unit (PTEU) increased by 51 percent from fall 2004 to fall 2008.

In particular, BCOE enrollment shows a steady increase in undergraduate education programs, while graduate programs appear to have peaked in 2006. The decline since 2006 is attributed in large part to steps taken in the Department of Elementary and Early Childhood Education to re-direct resources from its M.Ed. program to accommodate continued growth and popularity of the baccalaureate program. In 2008, BCOE's largest undergraduate program served P-5 education in Georgia with more than 270 newly certified teachers, thereby earning the distinction of graduating more students than any other University System of Georgia institution offering elementary education.

Earning an Ed.S. - A first at KSU

In July 2008, Kennesaw State University graduated its first class of Specialist in Education (Ed.S.) in Leadership for Learning candidates, marking the first time the university has conferred a degree beyond the master's level.

The Ed.S. degree is a milestone in the students' quest to earn the university's first doctoral degree, a Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) in Leadership for Learning. "The Ed.S. is the doctoral degree without the advanced research, doctoral seminar or dissertation," said Harriet Bessette, associate professor in the Department of Inclusive Education. "We embedded the Ed.S. in this program because we knew there were probably going to be some students who found the Ed.S. degree served them best."

The 27 students who received a specialist degree during the 2008 summer commencement completed 33 of the required 75 hours – 44 percent of the course work necessary for the doctoral degree.

"This is the only degree of its kind in Georgia," said Nita Paris, associate dean for Graduate Studies in the Bagwell



College and director of Ed.S. and Ed.D. programs. "Actually, there are few like it in the country, in that it brings teachers and administrators from five different concentrations – adolescent education/English, adolescent education/ mathematics, elementary and early childhood education, inclusive education and instructional technology – together in a cohort model to collaborate in finding solutions to address issues of student learning in P-12 schools."

Cynthia Kirk, a teacher at Fannin Middle School in Blue Ridge, Ga. was among the 2008 Ed.S. graduates. "I just think we are so fortunate to have our instructors' knowledge, their expertise, their support and their guidance," she said.

"You are paving the way for KSU and the Bagwell College of Education," Arlinda Eaton, the new dean of the college told the Ed.S. graduates. "You are our first Ed.S. graduates, and if you continue on, you'll receive the university's first doctorates. I hope you take great pride in this institution because we take great pride in you."

The Art of Teaching Science

Why would hard working, caring elementary and middle school science teachers sign on for 160 extra hours of classroom instruction? Just ask Kennesaw State University professors Tom Brown and Greg Rushton.

With a \$600,000 grant from the Georgia Department of Education, Brown and Rushton are helping science teachers better understand complex concepts such as physical forces, chemical reactions and geological changes so they can do a better job of educating Georgia students. "Teachers were having difficulty, not because they weren't competent, but because they were being asked to teach something out of their expertise," explained Rushton, project co-director and assistant chemistry professor in the College of Science and Mathematics. "The state curriculum has changed. Now the content has been narrowed down to a list of several standards in each grade level, and we're asked to teach them very deeply."

So far, the Northwest Georgia Science Education Partnership, launched in summer 2007, has prepared 120 science teachers from five northwest Georgia school systems. Georgia Highlands College and Georgia Tech collaborate with KSU along with three educational technology centers and two nonprofit educational organizations.

The result: the partnership wrapped up its first two-year term – 160 hours of workshops and professional development in science concepts, classroom techniques and skills to assess what students learned – in February 2009 with an astounding 93 percent retention rate. Fifty-three percent of participants showed substantial gains on a key subject matter assessment for science teachers, and 62 percent of their students had higher passing rates on the CRCT (Criterion Referenced Competency Test) than their school district's average.






"Two years and 160 hours of professional development is a long time," said Brown, associate professor of elementary science education in the Bagwell College of Education and project co-director. "The real measure of success was the overwhelmingly favorable feedback from our teachers. If you don't impact the teachers and support them, they can't take that back to their school."

The success that Brown and Rushton have had served them well in obtaining another \$830,000 grant from the Georgia Department of Education. With this new funding, the program will continue from summer 2009 through 2011, preparing another 150 teachers – including sixthgrade science teachers and educators from two other counties.

INITIATIVES

New STEM Initiative



Newly renovated House # 59 on Campus Loop Road is now the Center for Teacher Development in Science and Mathematics one of the many science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) initiatives on the KSU campus. In collaboration with the College of Science and Mathematics, the Bagwell College of Education is taking a series of measures to address the high-need areas of science and mathematics. The center represents our most recent effort, an important step in the growth of KSU as a leader in science and math teacher education.

Approximately 6,000 square feet of space provide several faculty offices, a spacious professional development lab with 31 computer stations, a classroom, a conference room, a preparation room, space for graduate assistants and a reception area. Faculty from both colleges will be housed at the center, which will increase the opportunities for faculty to partner on a variety of projects.

With the Georgia Youth Science and Technology Centers (GYSTC) located in the facility, Dr. Frank Butler, executive director of GYSTC, explained that "The regional coordinators of GYSTC, all experienced classroom science and mathematics teachers, value an association with the KSU faculty of the Center for Teacher Development and see potential for research on teacher effectiveness as it relates to their own work with teachers."

The overarching goal of the center is

to address the needs of Georgia's P-12 schools in science and mathematics. To that end, the center will focus on the following areas:

- Enhancement of in-service teacher development and effectiveness
- Implementation of innovative strategies to retain new teachers
- Stimulation of P-12 student interest in science and mathematics
- Recruitment of future science and math teachers

The center will also enhance faculty excellence by promoting the scholarship and research efforts of all KSU faculty members engaged in P-12 science and mathematics education. It will contribute to the improvement of practicing teachers' overall effectiveness in the classroom and the retention of teachers in the profession. Our professional development programs will enable teachers to show students how science and mathematics relate to the world around them as well as introduce students to the many professional career opportunities related to college degrees in STEM fields.

Early Learning Center is on the Horizon

Early childhood educators in the Bagwell College of Education are focusing much of their energy on plans to construct an Early Learning Center on the Kennesaw State University campus.

Land has been purchased and an architectural rendering of a green, one-story building has been drawn. The facility will serve 220 children, ages birth through 5, from the community. Enthusiasm for the project is widespread. "We are excited about the future and look forward to building a model facility that will enhance early learning in Georgia and in the southeast region of the United States," said Dr. Raynice Jean-Sigur, associate professor of Early Childhood Education. At this time, the only obstacle holding the college back from breaking ground is sufficient funding to build the facility.

The 25,000-square-foot facility will include classrooms, multipurpose space, observation rooms, administrative offices and teacher work rooms. The center will support the preparation and development of KSU students aspiring to become early childhood educators. Additionally,



KSU students and faculty will engage in research activities in the center and will contribute to the body of knowledge regarding early learning.

"The legacy we want to leave Kennesaw State University is an early learning model that prepares all children to be their best," said Dr. Loretta Howell-Lillard, professor of Early Childhood Education.

Our mission is to establish an Early Learning Center that will serve as a model for early learning education in the southeastern United States. It will provide a rich Spanish-English bilingual environment for native English speakers and English language learners.

The Early Learning Center is one of the initiatives in the comprehensive capital campaign at Kennesaw State University. The \$9,904,729 budget includes construction of the facility, as well as the initial capital expenditures needed for completion of the project. Thus far, we have received generous donations in the amount of \$1,555,000. With additional contributions, the center will soon become a reality and, according to Dr. Feland Meadows, Goizueta Endowed Chair, we will be able to "provide children with the opportunity to achieve their highest potential, both in school and in life."

Eighth Annual ESOL Conference

More than 700 K-12 teachers from 84 Georgia school districts gathered at the KSU Center in February 2009 to attend the Eighth Annual ESOL Conference. A partnership between the Bagwell College and the Georgia Department of Education, this three-day event featured more than 30 breakout sessions each day by experts on topics such as: World-Class Instructional Design and Assessment (WIDA), Response to Intervention (RTI), immigration issues, cultural diversity, Georgia performance standards and current best practices for teachers of multicultural students. The sessions were tailored to grade level/subject to ensure all in attendance had a variety from which to select.

Annual Conference on Literature for Children and Young Adults

Award-winning authors Steven Kellogg, J. Patrick Lewis, Laurie Halse Anderson, Ned Vizzini and Bill Konigsberg headlined the Bagwell College's 2009 Annual Conference on Literature for Children and Young Adults. The 2009 conference, coordinated by Dr. Alice Snyder, marked the 20th anniversary of this event founded by Mr. Robert Williams in 1990. Attendees enjoyed inspirational keynote addresses by the authors, engaging breakout sessions and wonderful camaraderie. KSU pre-service and graduate students attended, along with students from other Georgia universities, media specialists, public librarians and university faculty.



Bagwell College Graduate Conferences

Several times each year, Bagwell College of Education (BCOE) graduate students plan an event to showcase their research-based projects to professional audiences. This professional conference is planned and delivered entirely by graduate students. It is a collaborative effort that provides opportunities to expand their network of colleagues, learn skills in planning and delivering professional development opportunities, and expand their expertise and knowledge of research within and outside their areas of concentration. BCOE administrators and faculty members evaluate the students' presentations on the quality of their research, content knowledge, organization, technology and delivery. "Teachers Leading the Learning Revolution" was the theme of the May 2009 conference, where 97 graduate students in BCOE master's and doctoral degree programs presented their research. "Oh, The Places You'll Go" was the theme of the Summer 2008 conference, featuring 31 graduate presentations from the Department of Elementary and Early Childhood Education.

BAGWELL COLLEGE OUTREACH

Connecting with the Community

Bagwell College of Education faculty and staff participate in many community outreach programs, a few of which are highlighted below.

Elementary Science Olympiad

The Elementary Science Olympiad (ESO) is designed for children to work collaboratively as dynamic teams in each of the 18 events that include inquirybased, hands-on activities addressing earth, life and physical science topics. ESO also incorporates both engineering and technological principles in a meaningful and relevant manner.

Dr. Tom Brown, associate professor of Science Education in the Department of Elementary and Early Childhood Education, is the director of the State Elementary Science Olympiad.

In May 2009, KSU hosted the largest Elementary Science Olympiad in the United States, where a record 1,200 students from 58 elementary school teams competed. Kedron Elementary in Peachtree City won the competition, with Euharlee Elementary in Euharlee taking second place and Sedalia Park Elementary in Marietta taking third place. Highlights of the day included performances from Ron Anglin, the Physics Juggler, and the award-winning Kell High School Robotics Team.



Cherokee County ESOL Middle School Day

In March 2009, 94 students from six middle schools in Cherokee County School District visited the KSU campus. The students represented 19 countries, including Russia, China, Mexico, Brazil, Cuba, Pakistan, Kenya and Iran. PTEU faculty from the College of the Arts, the College of Science and Mathematics, and the College of Humanities and Social Sciences joined Bagwell College faculty in leading presentations for the students. The Office of Admissions provided campus tours. This has become an annual event led by Cherokee County ESOL Coordinator Desiree Chandler along with faculty in the Bagwell College.

Future Educators

More than 800 future educators participated in five workshops held at several nearby college campuses. This long-standing KSU program is designed to attract high school students into the teaching profession. The Bagwell College of Education partners with Southern Polytechnic State University, Georgia Highlands College and Georgia Perimeter College to encourage participation by offering retreats at convenient locations throughout the metro Atlanta area. Keynote speakers included BCOE associate professor Dr. Michael Ross, 2008 Georgia Teacher of the Year and BCOE graduate Emily Jennette and 2009 Georgia Teacher of the Year Leanne Maule.

KSU International Teacher Preparation Programs for the Global Age – Study Abroad

More than 40 BCOE and PTEU students participated in International Teacher Education Programs in 2008-2009 and received \$70,000 in scholarships. A requisite component of this experience includes substantive student participation in a cross-cultural community service project in the country where they studied. Upon return to campus, the students shared their

international experiences with KSU classes and the community. For the first time, 12 KSU student teachers completed all the requirements to earn Global Learning Certification, and they were recognized at the spring 2009 graduation for this achievement.

Four KSU students and two area teachers spent the summer of 2008 teaching English to middle





and elementary school students in Seongdong-gu, South Korea, Cobb County's sister city. They lived with Korean families to experience family life, culture, travel and schooling in the Asian nation. Other study abroad participants completed similar residencies in Costa Rica, Ecuador, Belize and Trinidad.

Research

Every international engagement activity has a qualitative and quantitative research component consisting of pre-surveys and post-data instruments to assess student learning outcomes congruent with global learning goals. Results are analyzed based on data from: (1) student questionnaires, (2) collaborating in-country teachers, principals and school directors, and (3) KSU study abroad student journals focusing on:

- a) cultural, linguistic, and socioeconomic variation
- b)instructional strategies and flexibility
- c) curriculum choices and
- d)increased awareness in the areas of sensitivity, empathy and commitment

Follow-up research is conducted on the impact of students teaching abroad and the influence these experiences have on teaching in diverse and interdependent P-12 classrooms in the United States. Results of this research citing the positive impact of student teaching abroad were presented in two paper presentations at the annual meeting of the American Educational Research Association (AERA) in spring 2009.

BAGWELL COLLEGE OUTREACH

KSU graduates Susan Grigg (see cover) and Andrea King (see cover) were named Georgia's 2008 National Milken Educators of the Year. Grigg is the International Baccalaureate Primary Years program coordinator at Sawyer Road Elementary School in Marietta City Schools. King is an expert in differentiated instruction and works with students who are gifted, as well as those with special needs, at Rock Chapel Elementary School in the DeKalb County School District. This prestigious honor is awarded annually by the Milken Family Foundation of California and includes a \$25,000 cash award for each recipient.

Angela Fenton, a seventh-grade social studies teacher at McClure Middle School, was named the 2008-2009 Teacher of the Year for the Cobb County School District. She earned her undergraduate degree in Middle Grades Education at Kennesaw State University. Justin Timms, a Gordon Central High School political science teacher, is the 2008-2009 Gordon County Schools Teacher of the Year. Timms holds a B.A. in history and political science from Shorter College and a master's degree in Educational Leadership from Kennesaw State University.

Kathie Wood was named Teacher of the Year for Marietta City Schools and placed among the top ten finalists for the 2010 Georgia Teacher of the Year. Wood received her M.Ed. in Adolescent Education - English/Language Arts from Kennesaw State University in 2005 and is currently enrolled in the Educational Leadership endorsement program in the Bagwell College of Education. She teaches at Marietta Middle School. Two KSU graduates, **Pat Calvert** and **Rebecca Kupecky**, were among 35 of Georgia's best and brightest new teachers to receive a New Teacher Assistance Grant from Georgia Power. Calvert is a third-grade teacher at Green Acres Elementary School in Cobb County, and Rebecca Kupecky is a math teacher at South Paulding Middle School. The grants were presented in September 2008 at an awards ceremony at Georgia Power headquarters in Atlanta.


