GENERAL INFORMATION

Olens was elected Georgia's 53rd attorney general in 2010 and re-elected in 2014. In his role, Olens worked with the governor and legislature to strengthen the penalties for sex trafficking and protect the victims. He also guided a comprehensive revision of Georgia's sunshine laws and led the effort to stem the epidemic of prescription drug abuse. Additionally, in cooperation with the Georgia Food Bank Association and Young Lawyers Division of the State Bar of Georgia, Olens established the Georgia Legal Food Frenzy, which has collected the equivalent of over 5 million pounds of food for Georgia's youth.

Prior to being elected attorney general, Olens was chairman of the Cobb County Board of Commissioners, serving from August 2002 through March 2010. He previously served as a county commissioner from 1999 through June 2002. He also served as chair of the Atlanta Regional Commission from December 2004 through 2009, and as vice-chair of the Metropolitan North Georgia Water District from 2005 through March 2010.

Olens is the recipient of numerous awards and honors for leadership and service. In 2016, *Georgia Trend* magazine named him the Georgian of the Year, and he has been listed among the publication's "100 Most Influential Georgians" for 13 consecutive years. That same year, Olens was presented with the Silver Beaver Award, which is the highest honor a local Boy Scout Council can present to a volunteer. In 2015, Olens received the Charles L. Weltner Freedom of Information Award, and in 2013, he received the Distinguished Alumni Award from the Emory University School of Law. Additionally, in 2011, the Cobb Chamber of Commerce honored Olens for his dedication to community and philanthropic service by naming its annual community service award the "Sam Olens Business Community Service Award."

He recently served as vice president of the National Association of Attorneys General, having previously served as chair of the 13-state Southern Region both in 2013 and 2015. Olens is a registered mediator/arbitrator with the Georgia Office of Dispute Resolution and has been admitted to practice law in Georgia and the District of Columbia.

Olens received his juris doctorate from Emory University School of Law, and holds a bachelor's and master's degree from American University in international politics.

He and his wife Lisa have two children, Lauren and Jonathan.

Kennesaw State University Highlights

Highlights from 2015-2016

- Kennesaw State began its first year as a consolidated university, following approval by the Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia of consolidation with Southern Polytechnic State University, making it one of the 50 largest public universities in the nation.
- Kennesaw State University was elevated to an R3 classification a doctoral research institution with moderate research activity by The Carnegie Classification of Institutions of Higher Learning; http://www.carnegieclassifications.iu.edu/lookup/view_institution.php?unit_id=140164.
- New buildings or expansions opened on the Kennesaw Campus, including the Dr. Betty L. Siegel Student Recreation and Activities Center, the Chantal and Tommy Bagwell Education Building, and the Horace W. Sturgis Library renovation.
- Kennesaw State named a new School of Communication and Media.
- The University had several new degree programs approved by the Board of Regents, including the Bachelor of Science in Environmental Engineering, a Bachelor of Science in Public Health Education, a Bachelor of Science in Journalism and Emerging Media, and a Bachelor of Arts in Asian Studies.
- Kennesaw State University graduated the 100,000th student in its history.
- The Kennesaw State football program played its first season.

Highlights from 2016-2017

- Enrollment at Kennesaw State exceeded 35,000 students pursuing bachelor's, master's, and doctorate degrees on both the Kennesaw and Marietta campuses and online.
- Through the continued generosity of donors, the University opened opportunities for student learning in a wide variety of areas, including establishment of three endowed chairs: the Leven Chair of Culinary Sustainability and Hospitality; the Chantal and Tommy Bagwell Chair of Education; and the Thomas M. and Elizabeth D. Holder Chair of Nursing.
- According to the University System of Georgia's Economic Impact Study, Kennesaw State topped \$1.3 billion in economic impact http://www.usg.edu/assets/economic_development/documents/USG_Impact_20152.pdf.
- University faculty continued to pursue innovative research opportunities, winning grant funding from a variety of public and private sources, including a \$250,000 National Science Foundation grant for the Bagwell College of Education, a \$1 million National Institutes of Health grant for the College of Science and Mathematics and much more.
- New degree programs include a new online Master of Science in Engineering Management, a Bachelor of Science in Cybersecurity, and a Bachelor of Business Administration with a major in Entrepreneurship.




Figure 1. Applications - Applied Freshmen, Accepted Freshmen, Enrolled Freshmen




Figure 2. Applied Transfer Students, Accepted Transfer Students, Enrolled Transfer Students¹

By Fiscal Year




Figure 3. Transfer Student Headcounts from USG and Non-USG Institutions






Figure 5. Majors by College¹






Figure 7. Race and Ethnicity by Term





Figure 8. Fall Semester County Enrollment






Figure 11. Total Student Credit Hours¹




Figure 12. Fall Enrollment Using IPEDS Enrollment Definitions





Figure 13. Enrollment by College and Degree Level

Enrollment by Fall Semesters




Figure 15. Primary Majors by College - College of the Arts

Enrollment by Fall Semesters



Enrollment by Fall Semesters




Figure 17. Primary Majors by College - College of Computing and Software Engineering

Enrollment by Fall Semesters





Enrollment by Fall Semesters




Figure 20. Primary Majors by College - WellStar College of Health and Human Services





Enrollment by Fall Semesters



Enrollment by Fall Semesters




Figure 24. Primary Majors by College - Other/Non- Degree Seeking

by Fiscal Years




Figure 25. College of Continuing and Professional Education Enrollment compared to Education Units

by Fiscal Years




Figure 26. College of Architecture and Construction Management Degrees Conferred

by Fiscal Years




Figure 27. College of the Arts Degrees Conferred

by Fiscal Years








Figure 31. Southern Polytechnic College of Engineering and Engineering Technology Degrees Conferred Master's





¹All headcounts are unduplicated. Full-Time Instructional Faculty are defined as faculty employed on a full-time basis for instruction. This includes those faculty who are categorized as "Faculty" or "Chair" and Employment Status is "Active" or "Paid On Leave" in the Faculty Information System (FIS).

²Academic tenure is an employment status at the University that assures a tenured faculty member of continuous appointment from contract year, except under conditions of dismissal for cause (see KSU Faculty Handbook Section 4.1.9), termination or layoff of tenured personnel due to program modification (see the Board of Regents (BOR) Policy Manual 8.3.7.10), or financial exigencies. The awarding of tenure is a highly important decision through which the University incurs a major commitment to the individual faculty member well into the future. Years of service or successful annual reviews alone are not sufficient to qualify for tenure. It should only be granted to those faculty members whose achievements demonstrate the quality and significance expected of their current rank and who demonstrate potential for long-term effectiveness at the University. All tenure track faculty are expected to produce scholarship in at least one performance area. This scholarship must be consistent with departmental, college, and university guidelines. Only under exceptional circumstances will a candidate be recommended for tenure without at least one form of scholarship as articulated in approved tenure and promotion guidelines. In awarding tenure, the University recognizes the long-range value of the faculty member to the institution and ensures them the academic freedom that is essential to an atmosphere conducive to the proper operation of the University.




Figure 36. Percent of Full-Time and Part-Time Instructional Faculty




Figure 37. New Full-Time Instructional Faculty



Last Five Fiscal Years


