President Kathy Schwaig



President Kathy Schwaig

Kathy 'Kat' Schwaig began her tenure as the sixth president of Kennesaw State University on March 16, 2022. Prior to assuming the role as president, Dr. Schwaig served as the University's provost and senior vice president for academic affairs.

As provost, Schwaig prioritized efforts that supported student success, including increasing the number of faculty and advisors and eliminating roadblocks to graduation. She worked collaboratively with the campus community to grow the University's undergraduate and graduate programs, while supporting the Office of Research's efforts to expand faculty research across the academic colleges. Schwaig also played a pivotal role in leading the University through the events related to the Covid-19 pandemic, including a return to campus in Fall 2021.

Schwaig previously served as the Dinos Eminent Scholar Chair of Entrepreneurial Management, as well as the dean of KSU's Michael J. Coles College of Business, a position she held from 2012 to 2019. She has held several other leadership roles at KSU, including interim and associate dean, interim department chair for the Department of Accounting, and interim department chair for the Department of Computer Science and Information Systems. Schwaig joined the faculty at KSU in 2002 as an associate professor of information systems. Prior to joining KSU, Schwaig held faculty positions at Georgia State University and Baylor University.

Schwaig's research focused on information privacy and policy formulation and has been published in some of the leading journals in the information systems field.

She has received the Oscar Burnett Award for Distinguished Achievement in Business from the Morris Brown College Foundation, the Cobb Executive Women's Glass Ceiling Award, and Atlanta Magazine's Women Making a Mark Award.

A native of central Texas, Schwaig earned a BBA in Accounting and an MBA in Information Systems from Baylor University, a Master of Liberal Arts from Johns Hopkins University, and a Ph.D. in Management Information Systems from the University of South Carolina.

Kennesaw State University Highlights

2021-2022

- Kennesaw State University experienced the second-largest enrollment increase among all University System of Georgia (USG) institutions to raise KSU's enrollment to nearly 43,000 students, making it the third consecutive year the University enjoyed substantial growth.
- Kennesaw State's online graduate degree programs were ranked among the best in Georgia and the nation by U.S. News & World Report in its "2022 Best Online Programs" and "2022 Best Online Programs for Veterans" issue, including recognition for programs in engineering, information technology and education.
- Kennesaw State was again recognized as a doctoral university with high research activity, or an R2 university, in a report by the Carnegie Classification of Institutions of Higher Education, marking the institution as one of the largest suburban research universities in the U.S.
- The Board of Regents of the USG approved a new doctoral degree – the Ph.D. in Computer Science – in the College of Computing and Software Engineering.
- The Executive Master of Business Administration was rated for the sixth consecutive year as best in Georgia and among the top in the world, according to CEO Magazine's 2022 Global Executive MBA rankings.
- The Board of Regents named Dr. Kathy Schwaig president of Kennesaw State.
- Kennesaw State University had an economic impact of \$1.84 billion on Georgia, according to a USG report. Kennesaw State's economic impact in FY 2021 marked an 11.6% increase from \$1.65 billion the previous year.
- The University appointed new deans, including Catherine Kaukinen as dean of the Norman J. Radow College of Humanities and Social Sciences, Sumanth Yenduri as dean of the College of Computing and Software Engineering, Karen Kornweibel as dean of KSU Journey Honors College, and Juliet Langman as dean of the Graduate College.
- Kennesaw State earned national recognition for its undergraduate instruction (among the top 40 schools nationally) and first-year student initiatives (in the top 55 schools in the nation) in the U.S. News & World Report 2022 Best Colleges rankings.
- Diverse: Issues in Higher Education ranked KSU among the nation's Top 100 colleges and universities for conferring degrees to minority students.
- Kennesaw State University is one of only 24 colleges and universities in the nation to receive an "A" for core curriculum excellence in the 2021-22 "What Will They Learn?" report by the American Council of Trustees and Alumni.
- Scrappy's Bucket List, a Division of Student Affairs program at Kennesaw State, earned a Catalyst Award called the "Optimizing the Student Experience Award," which recognizes the innovative program to increase student engagement.
- KSU researchers earned a \$1 million federal grant to train students to provide suicide and drug abuse prevention services for youth in five counties across rural northwest Georgia.
- Adrian Epps of the Bagwell College of Education was installed as the Chantal and Tommy Bagwell Endowed Dean's Chair, which was made possible by a \$1 million contribution from the Bagwells.
- The Kennesaw State cheerleading team earned a national championship at the 2022 NCA Collegiate Nationals.
- Wellstar College of Health and Human Services Dean Monica Swahn has received a multimillion-dollar grant from the National Institutes of Health for a study that will determine if vocational skills and economic empowerment improves mental health among young women who live in poverty.
- Kennesaw State political science professor Charity Butcher was recognized for her contributions to undergraduate and graduate teaching with the 2021 Distinguished Teaching Award from the American Political Science Association.
- Sohyun An, a professor in the Bagwell College of Education, earned the 2022 Distinguished Researcher Award from the American Educational Research Association Special Interest Group on Research on the Education of Asian Pacific Americans.
- Kennesaw State University researchers, Nikolaos Kidonakis and Marco Guzzi, were awarded a \$300,000 National Science Foundation grant to explore improvements in calculations that could advance the study of theoretical particle physics worldwide.
- The Southern Polytechnic College of Engineering and Engineering Technology was recognized for its focus on diversity, equity and inclusion by the American Society for Engineering Education.

A Brief History of Kennesaw State University

In the generation following World War II a host of forces (including the popularity of the GI Bill and a doubling of average family income) brought about a democratization of higher education, as colleges became more accessible to working class families. Georgia joined the national trend in creating a host of new institutions. With a burgeoning Georgia economy, Georgia Tech in 1948 opened a two-year branch at the old Naval Air Station in Chamblee. It took the name Southern Tech and offered practical, hands-on training in engineering technology. In 1961 the Board of Regents moved the school to Marietta. It prospered in the new location and, following a nationwide trend, became a four-year school in 1970. Ten years later in 1980, it split away from Georgia Tech as a separate unit of the University System.

Meanwhile, local leaders took note that Cobb was the largest county in Georgia without a liberal arts college. Their lobbying efforts persuaded the Board of Regents in 1963 to charter Kennesaw Junior College. The first students enrolled in September 1966, but because the Kennesaw campus was not ready in time, the first quarter was held in several designated classrooms on the Southern Tech campus.

For several decades, the two schools followed parallel paths. Kennesaw gained four-year status in 1976. In 1984 the Board of Regents approved Kennesaw's first MBA and M.Ed. programs. The following year the board awarded Southern Tech its first master's degree in Technology Management. Both schools gained university status in 1996. However, Kennesaw's enrollment increasingly outstripped its Cobb County neighbor. Due to dynamic growth in the Betty Siegel era, Kennesaw State by fall 1990 had 10,030 students, more than twice as large as Southern Tech's 4,018.

By fall 2013 Kennesaw was four times larger than Southern Polytechnic State University (24,629, compared to 6,549). In that year, in a cost-saving move during a national recession, the Board of Regents voted to merge the two schools under the name Kennesaw State University and under the direction of KSU President Dan Papp. The consolidation became official in January 2015. With 35,420 students in fall 2018 KSU was the 3rd largest university in Georgia and one of the 50 largest colleges and universities in the country. Kennesaw today offers more than 150 degree programs and has over 100,000 alumni.

The Kennesaw State University Archives was established in 2004 and is housed within the Department of Museums, Archives and Rare Books. Archivists use the collections of institutional records to connect and educate students about the value of primary sources and to serve as a hub for KSU's organizational and historical memory.

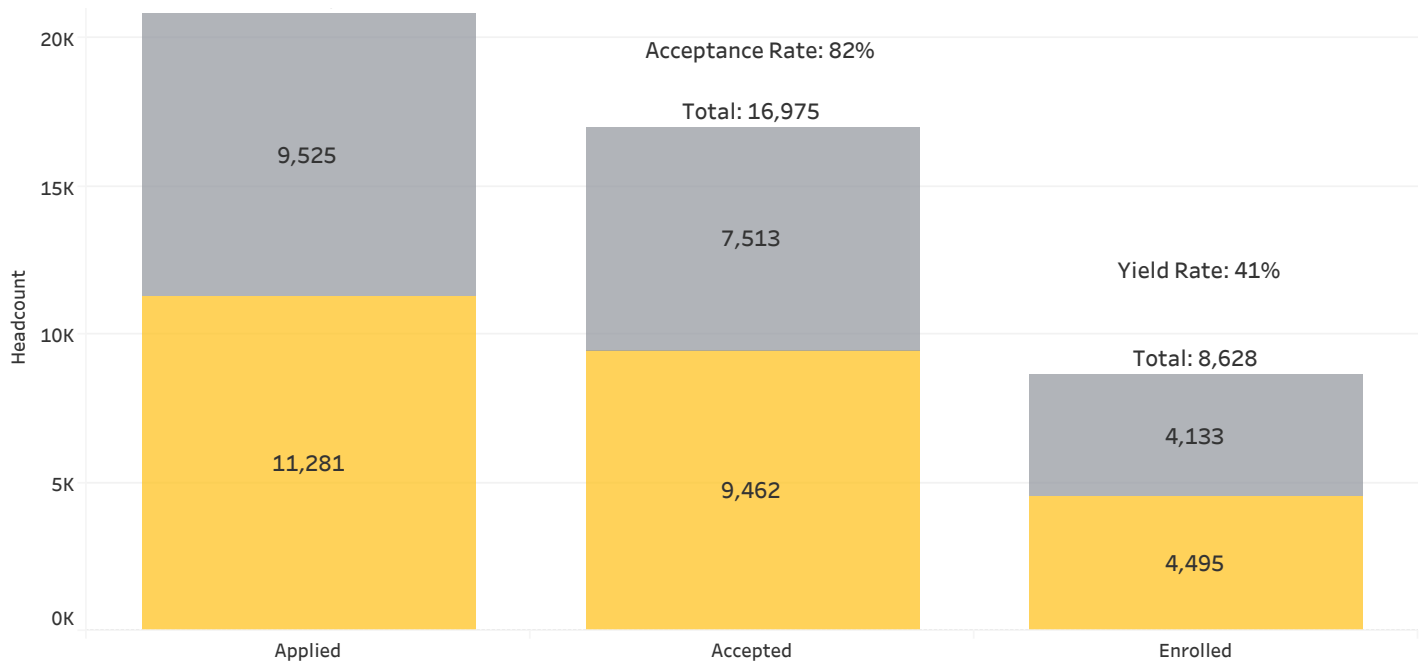


Figure 1. Applicants - Applied, Accepted, Enrolled Freshmen by Gender

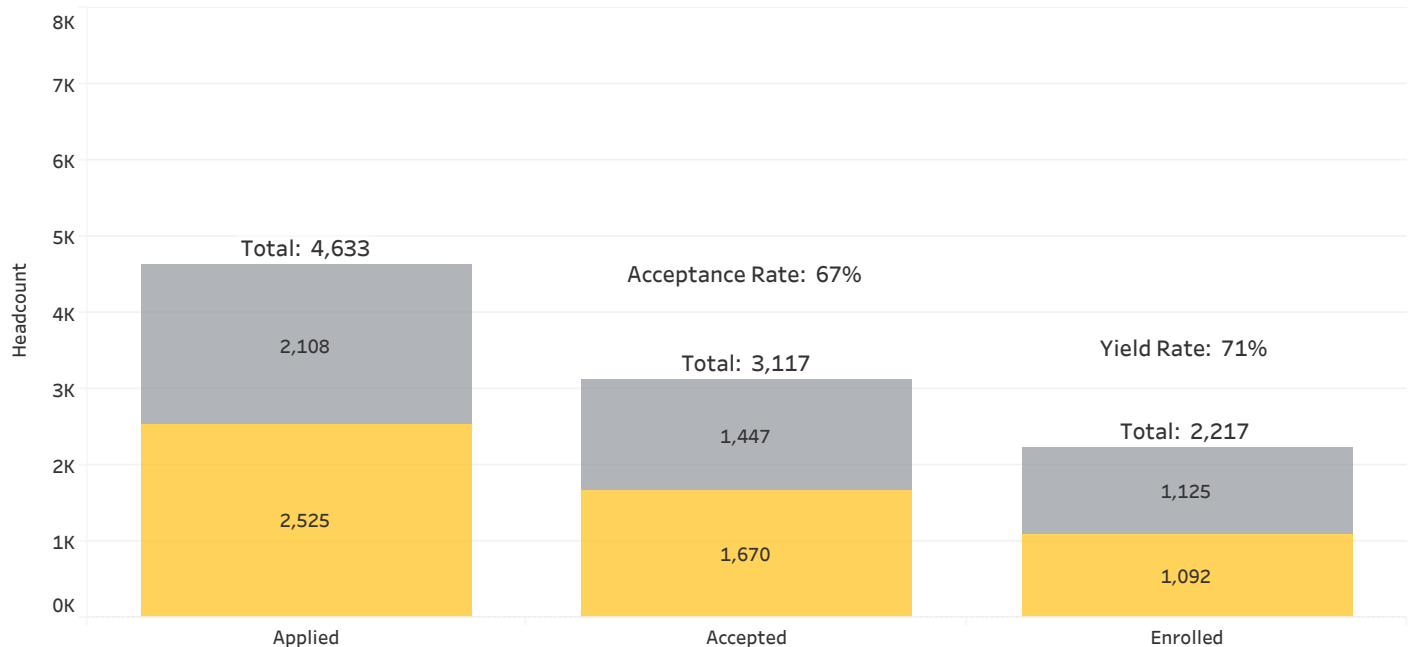


Figure 2. Transfer Students, Applied, Accepted and Enrolled

Comparisons of Undergraduate Transfer Students from USG and Non-USG Institutions Fiscal Years

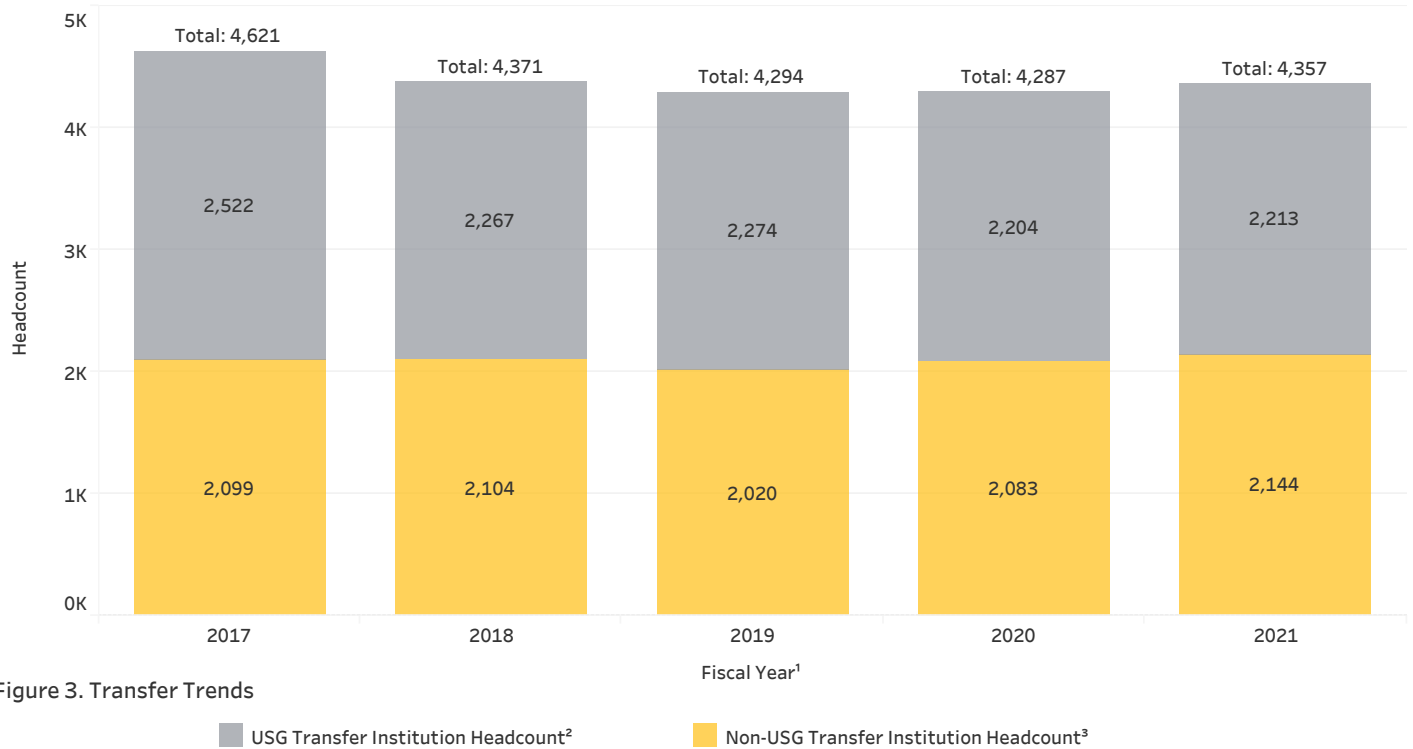


Figure 3. Transfer Trends

New Student Enrollment Trend

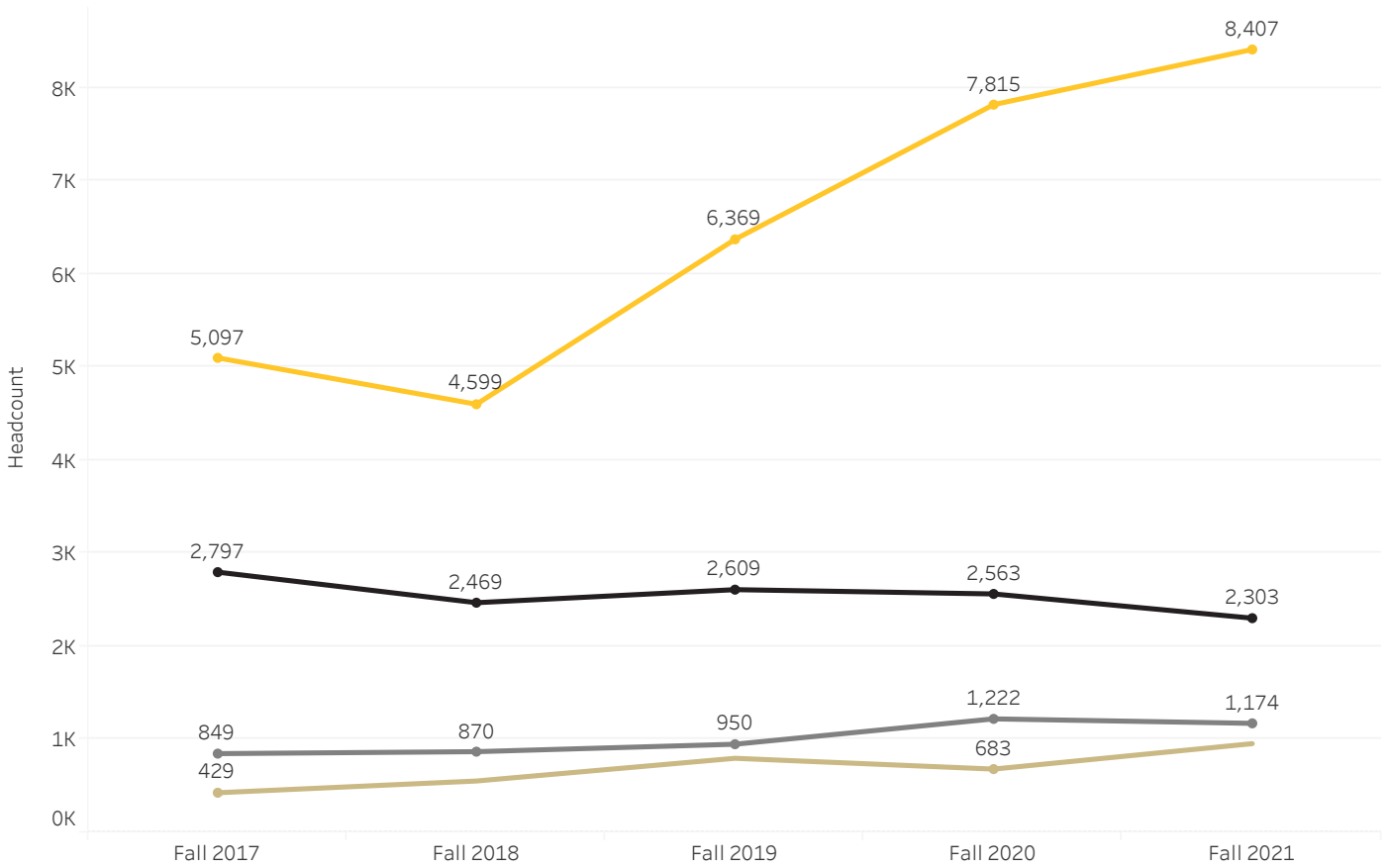


Figure 4. New Student Enrollment Trend

KSU Enrollment by Term Trend

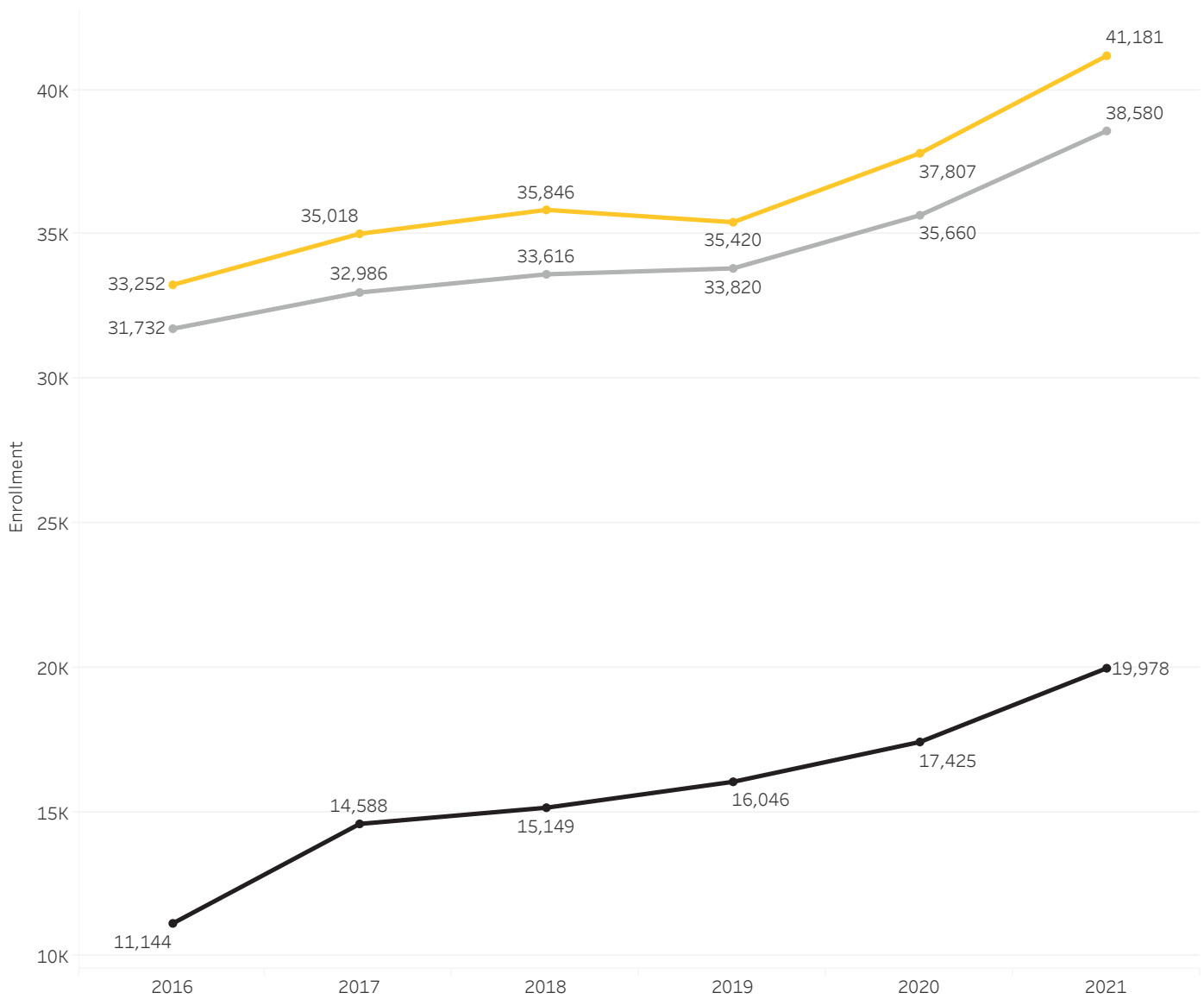


Figure 5. KSU Enrollment by Term Trend

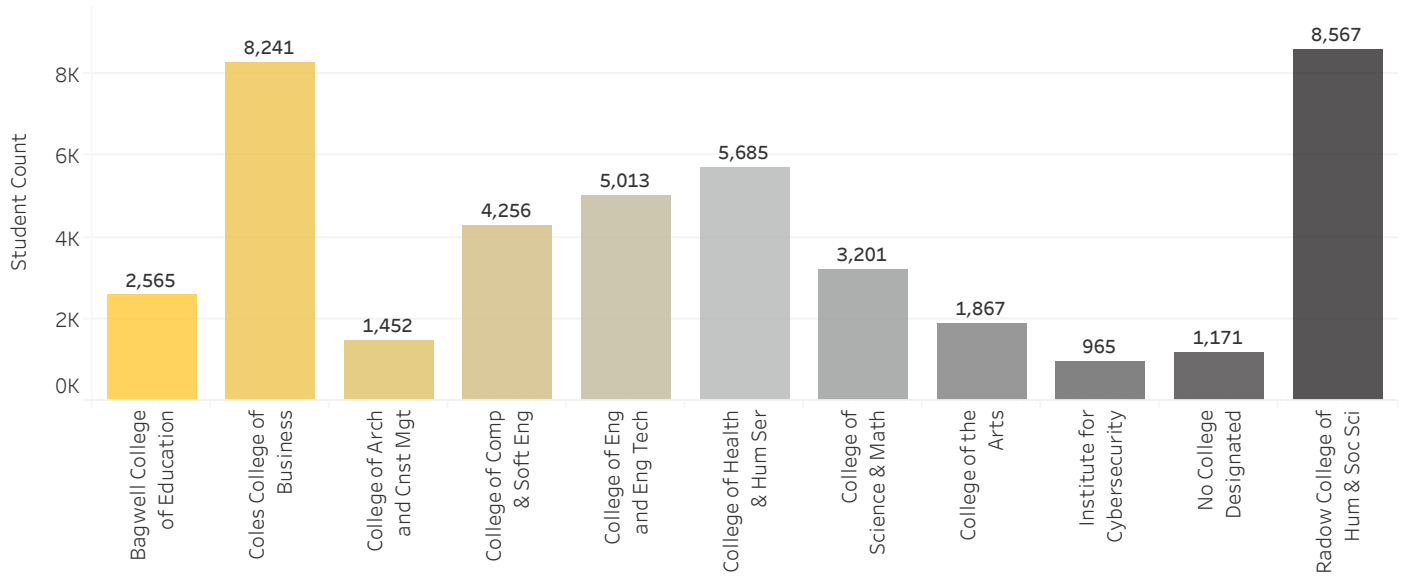


Figure 6. Enrollment by College

Enrollment Trend by Gender

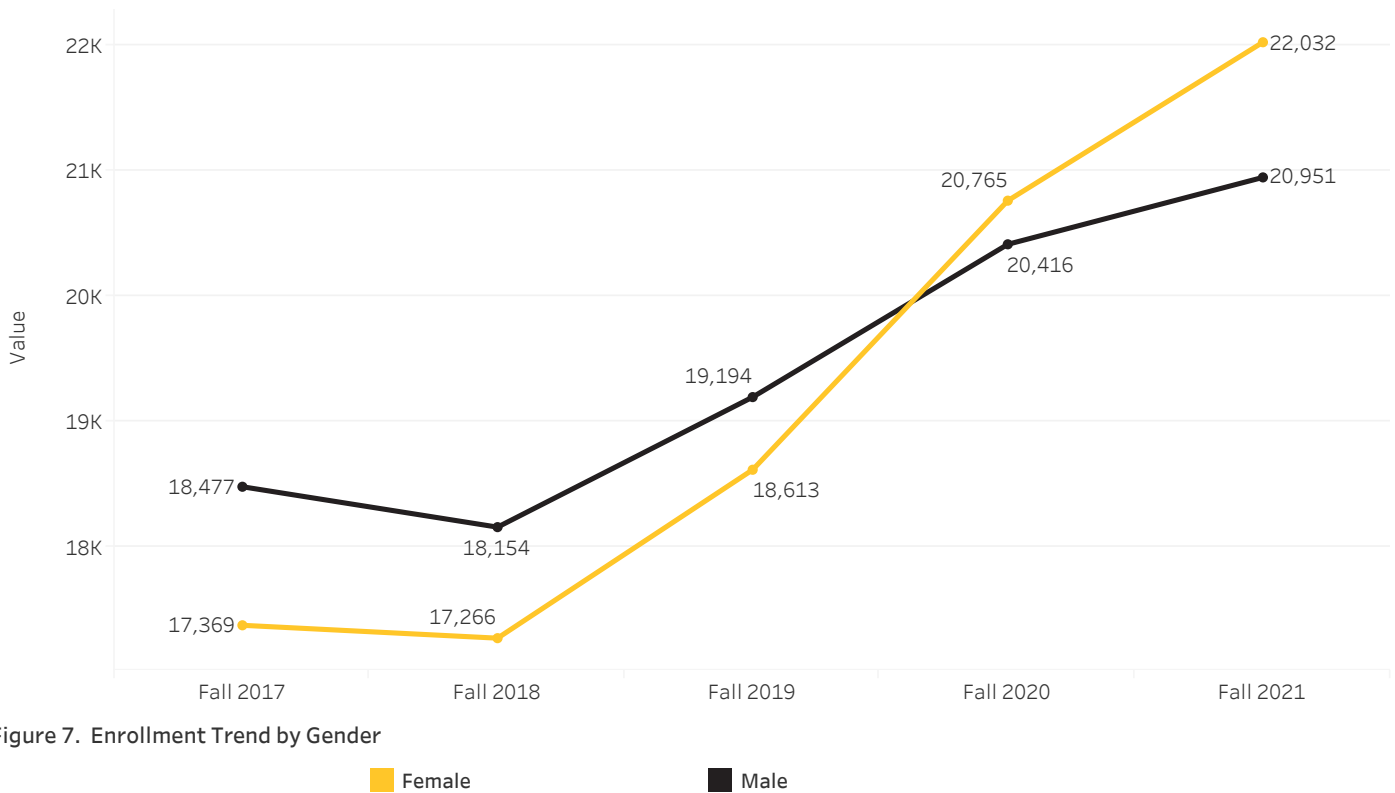


Figure 7. Enrollment Trend by Gender

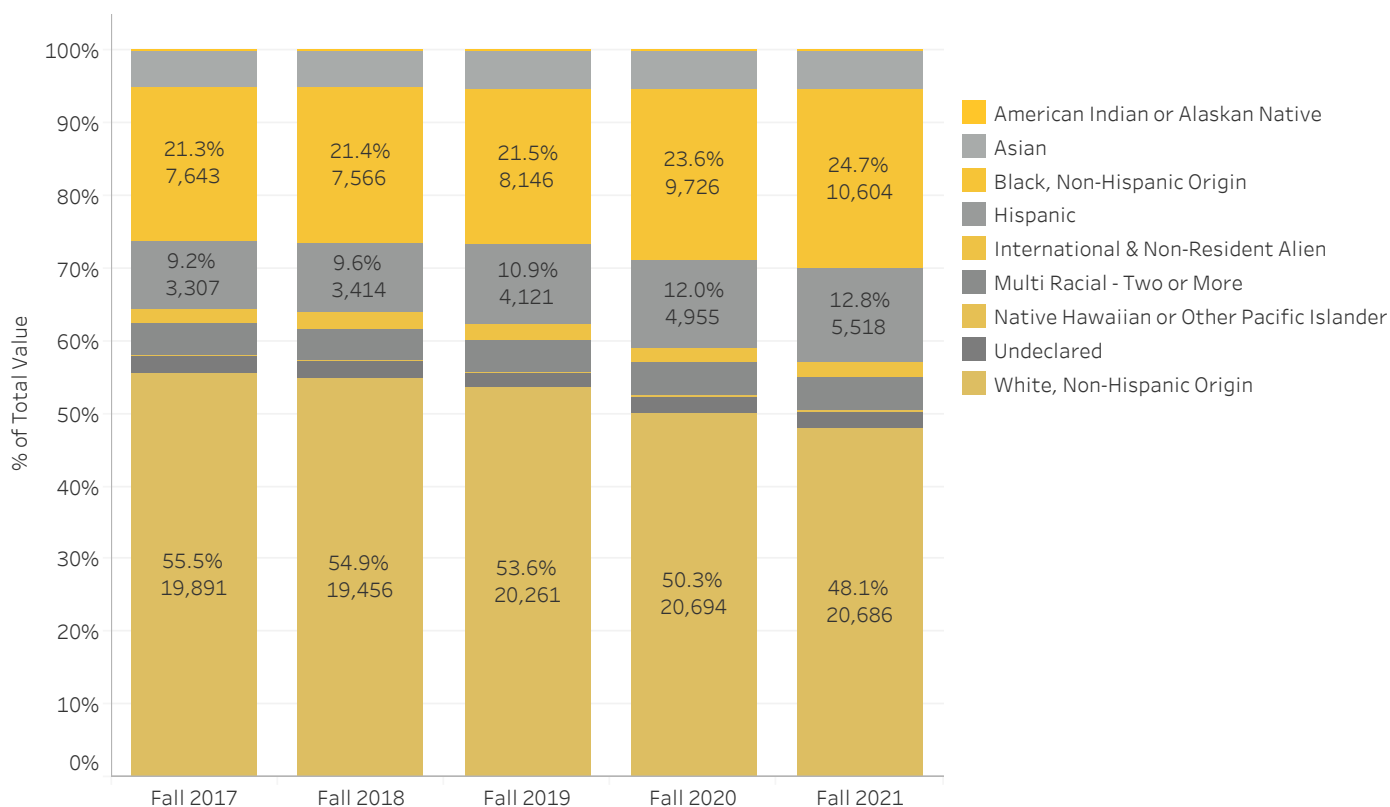


Figure 8. Race and Ethnicity Trend by Fall Semesters

Georgia Counties of Origin with Greater than 130 Enrolled Students Fall 2021

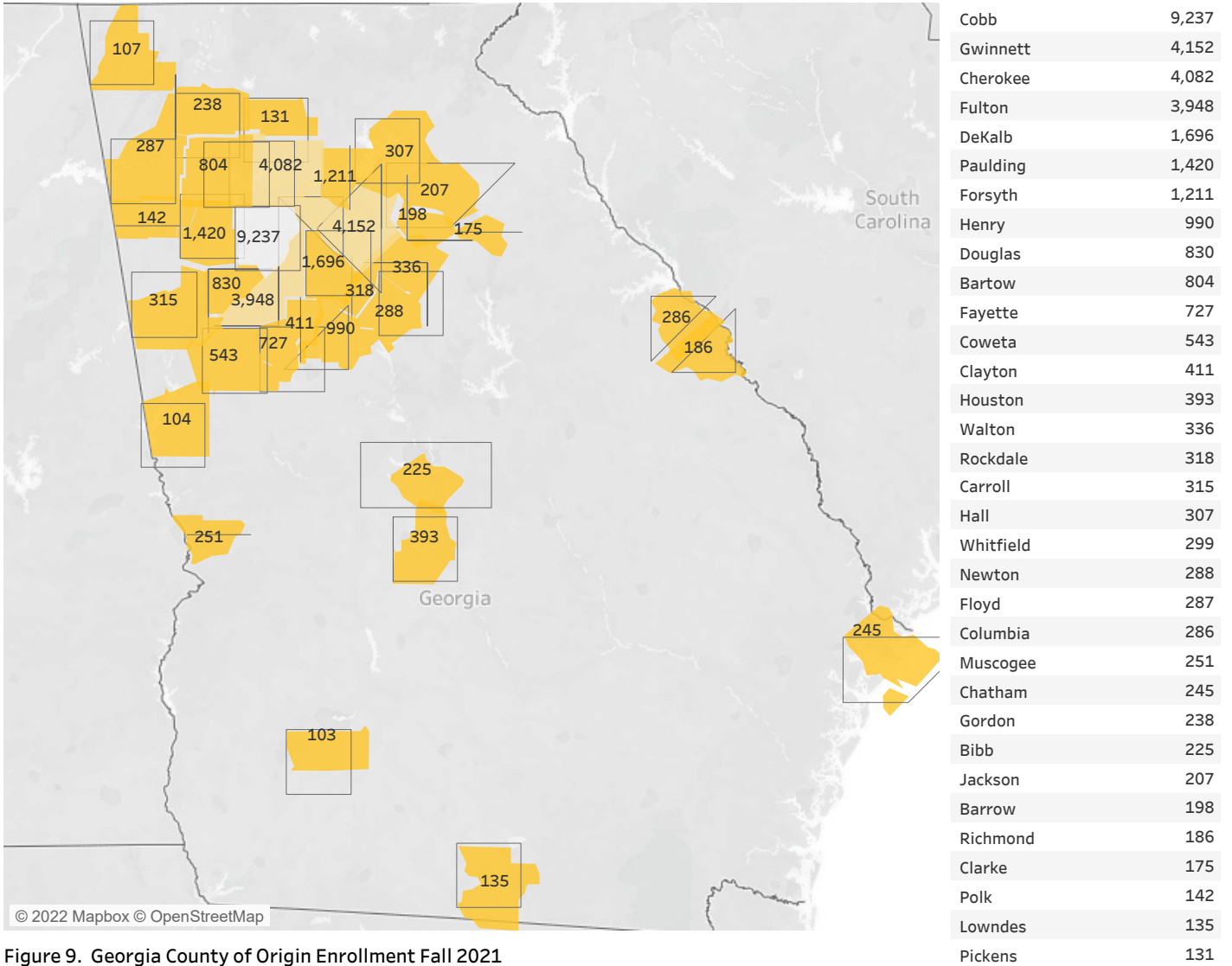


Figure 9. Georgia County of Origin Enrollment Fall 2021

Percentage of In-State Enrollment, Headcount for Tuition Purposes

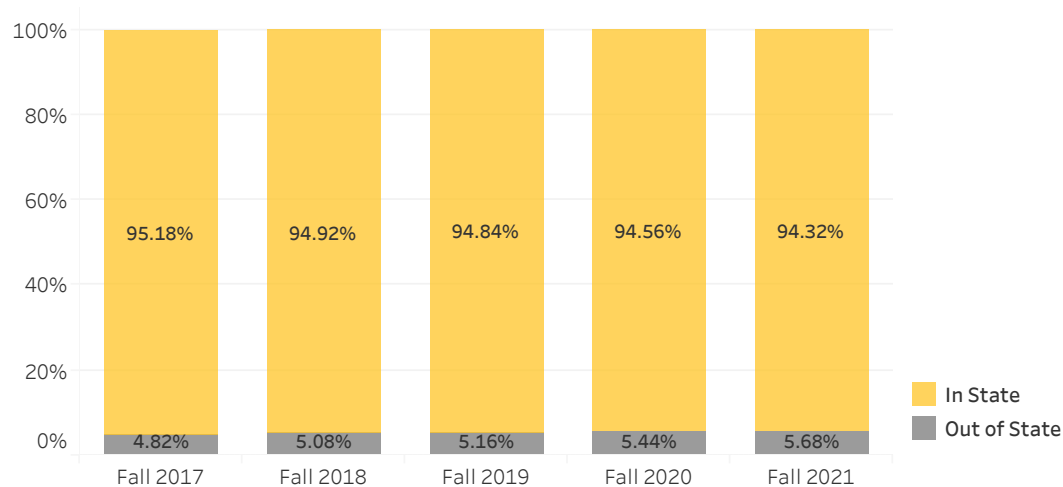


Figure 10. In-State Enrollment by Fall Semesters

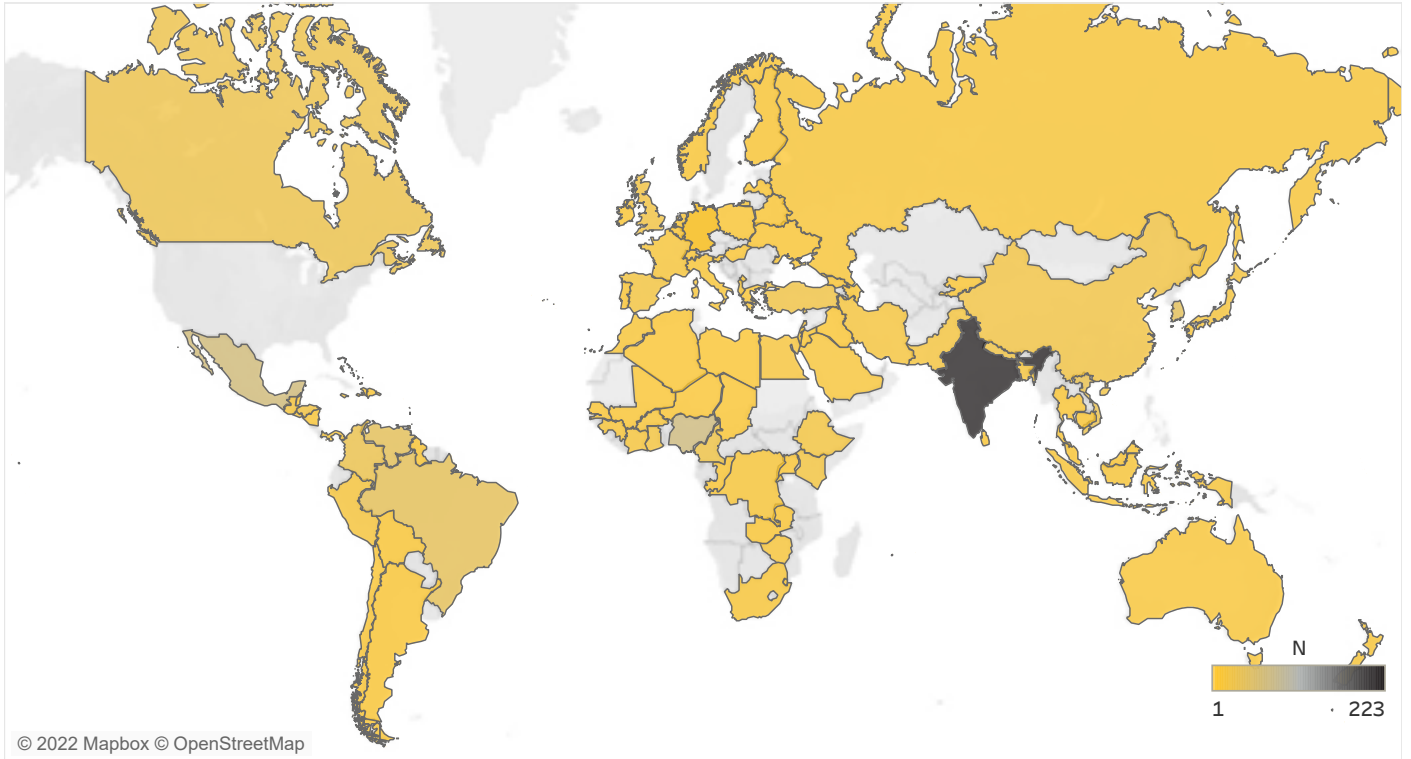


Figure 11. International Student Enrollment

Enrollment Breakdown vs Largest USG Institutions by Enrollment - Fall 2021

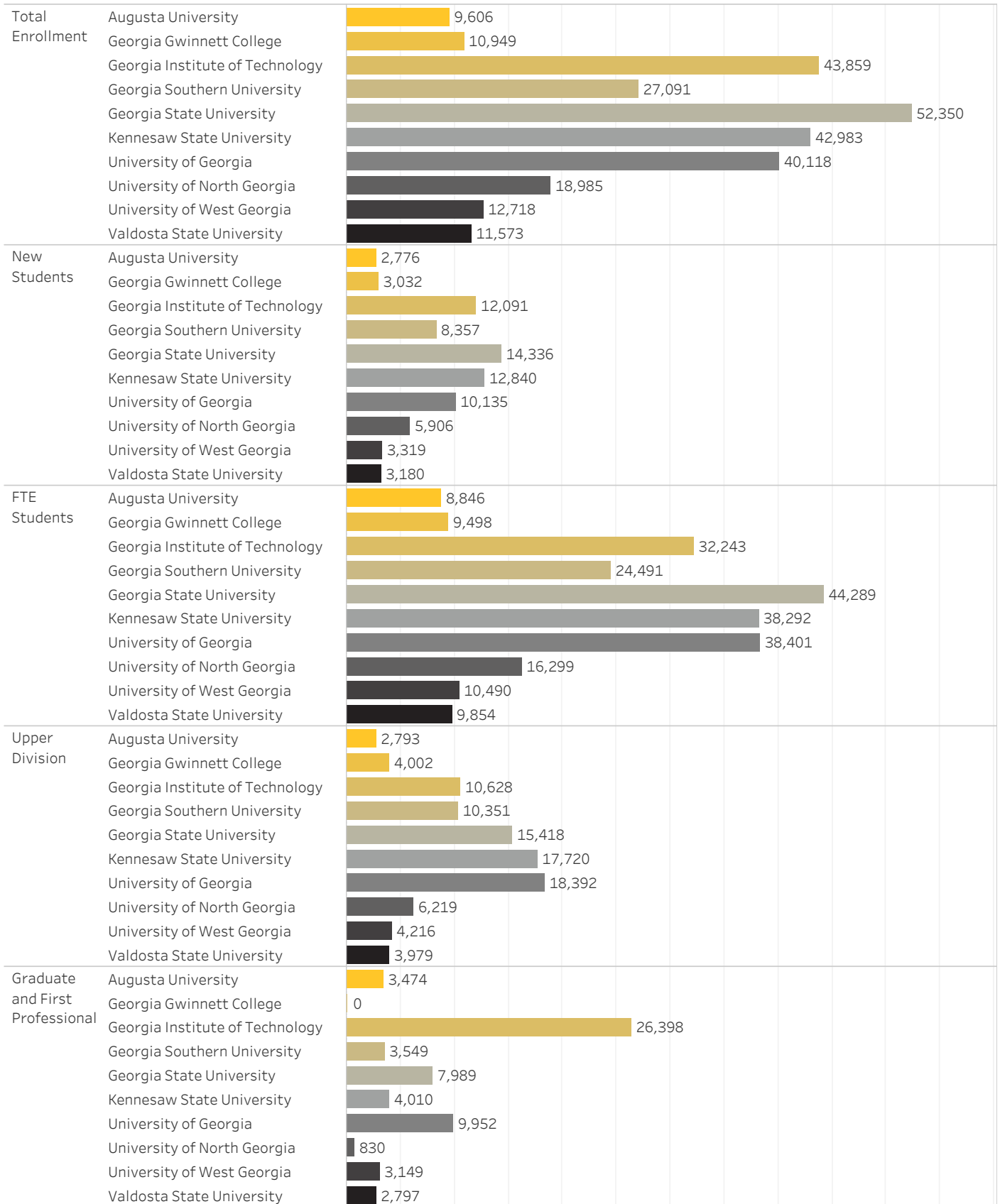


Figure 12. Enrollment Breakdown

Percent Change of Fall Enrollment Over Time for 10 Largest USG Institutions

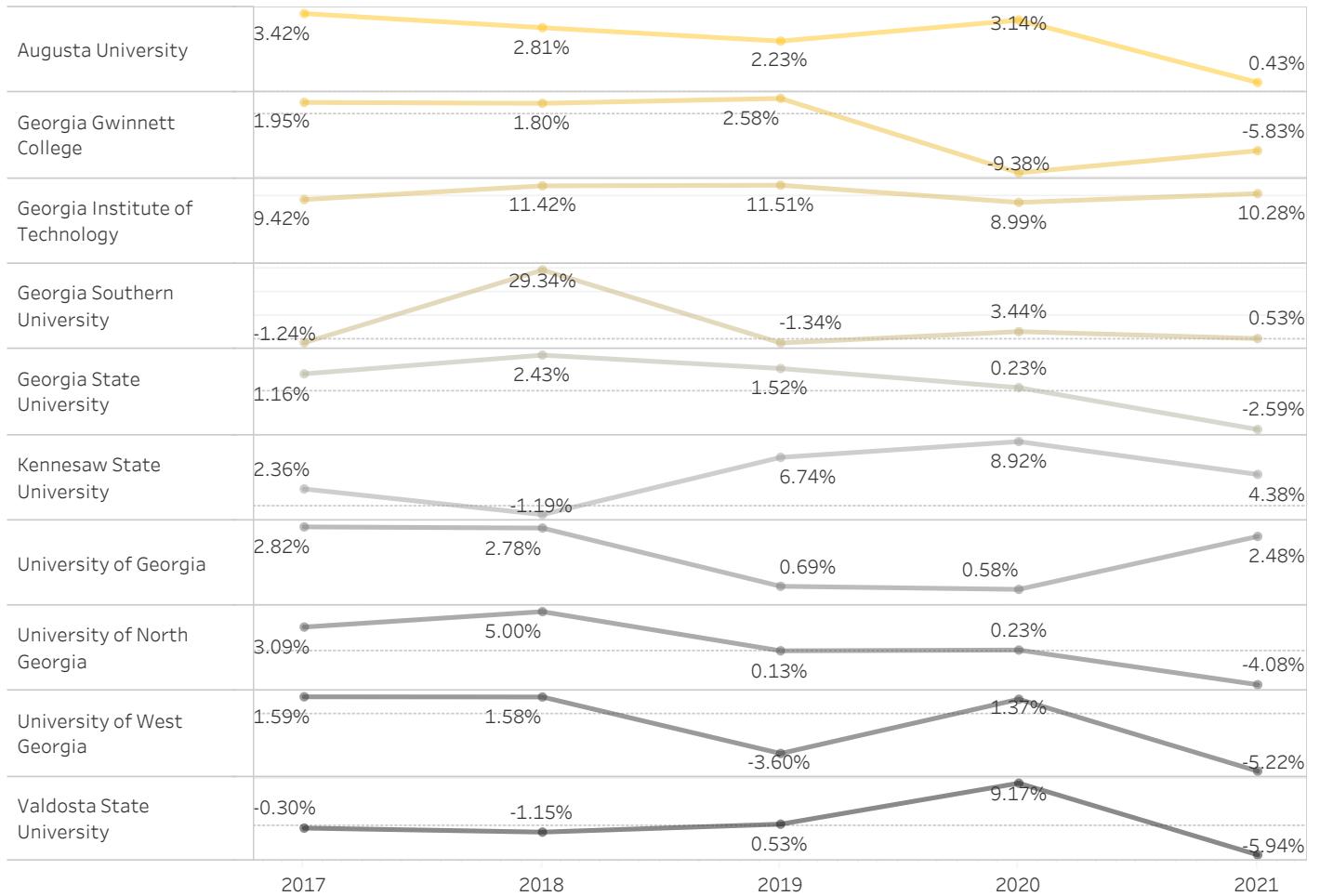


Figure 13. Percent Change of Fall Enrollment

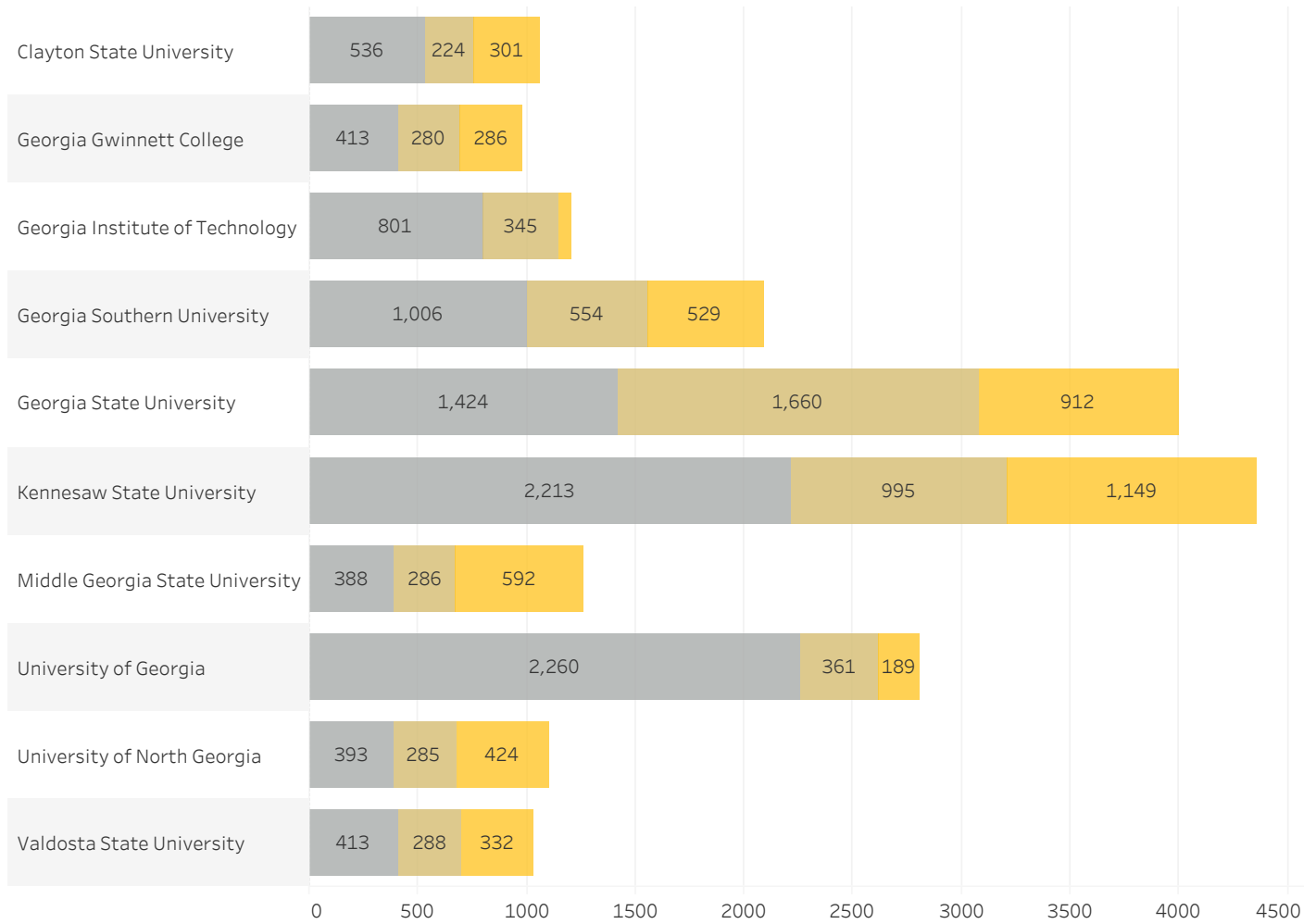


Figure 14. Transfers of 10 Largest USG Institutions

Six-Year Full-Time Graduation Rates for 10 Largest Institutions in USG, 2015 Cohort

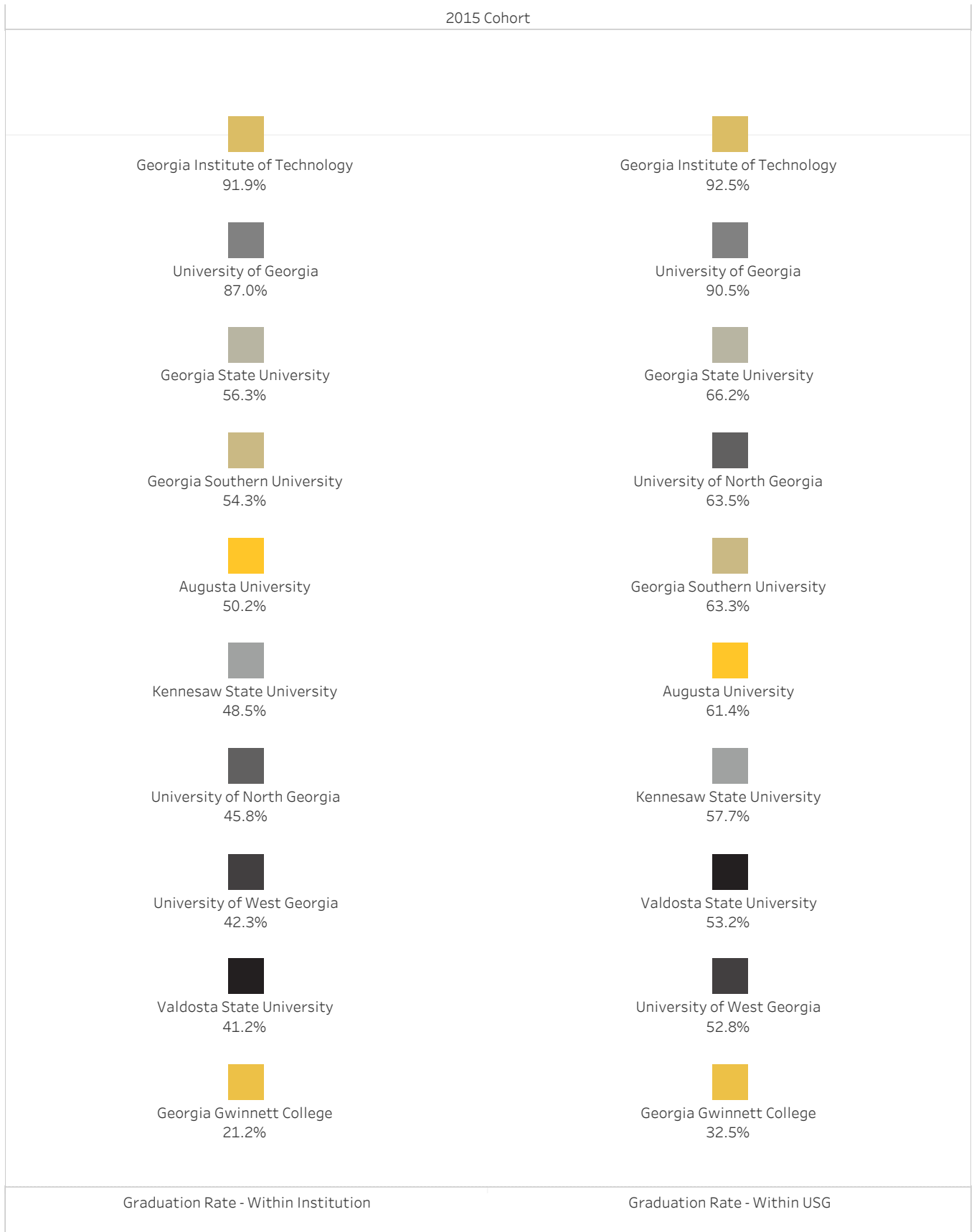


Figure 16. Six-Year Graduation Rates

Enrollment by College and Degree Level Fall 2021

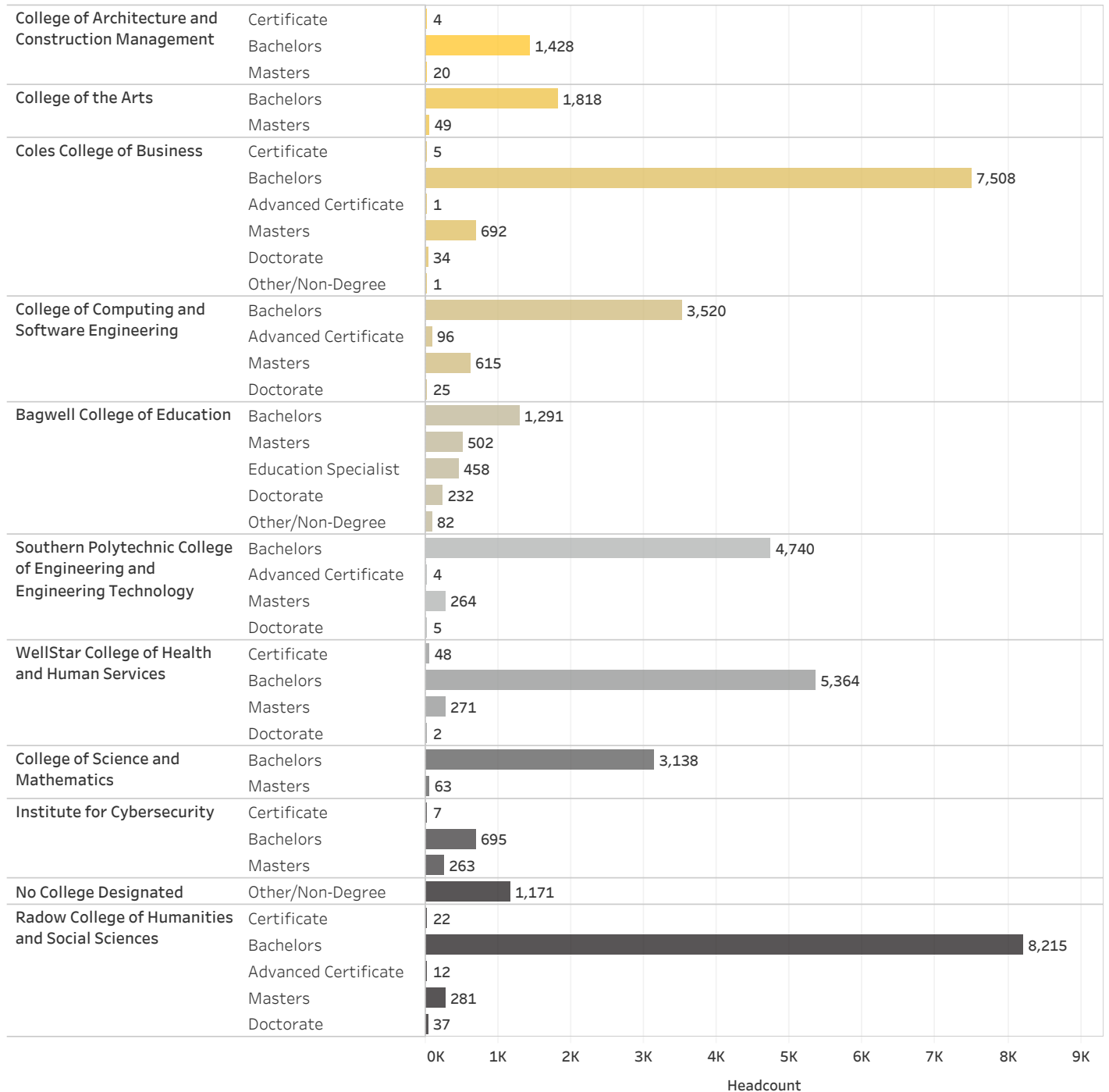


Figure 17. Enrollment by College and Degree Level

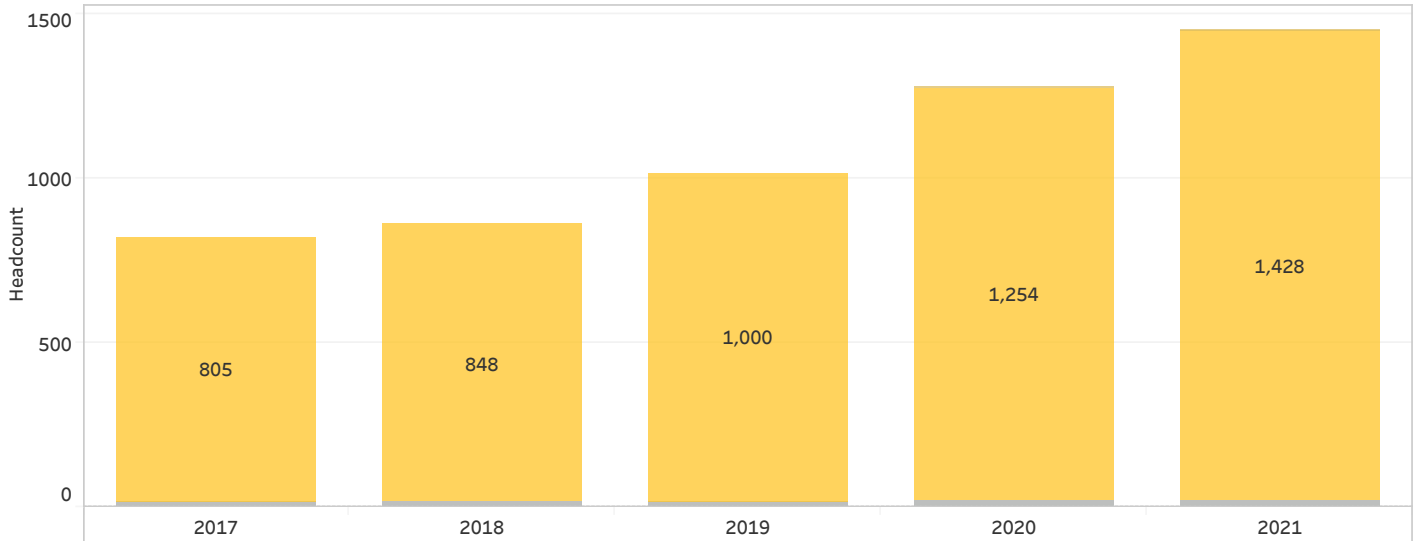


Figure 18. College of Architecture and Construction Management

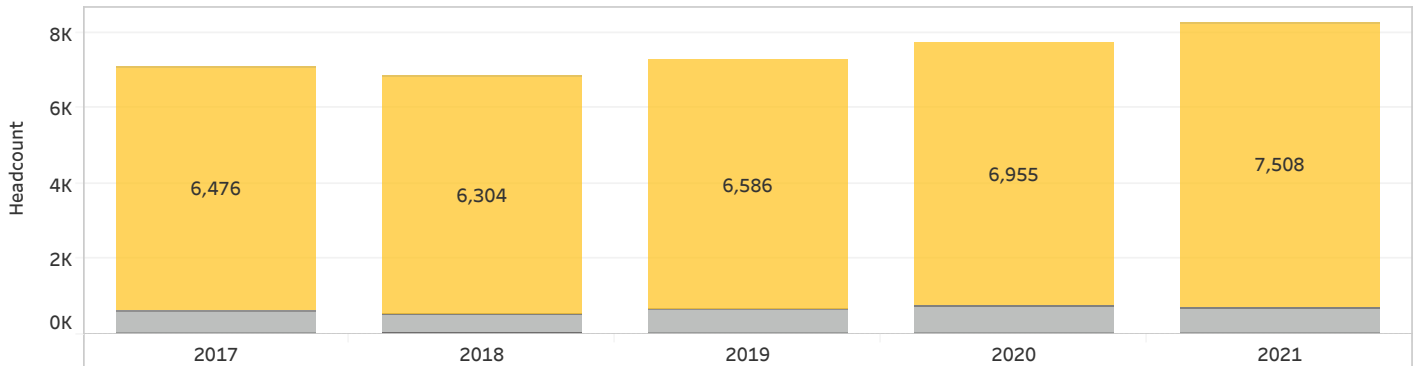


Figure 20. Coles College of Business

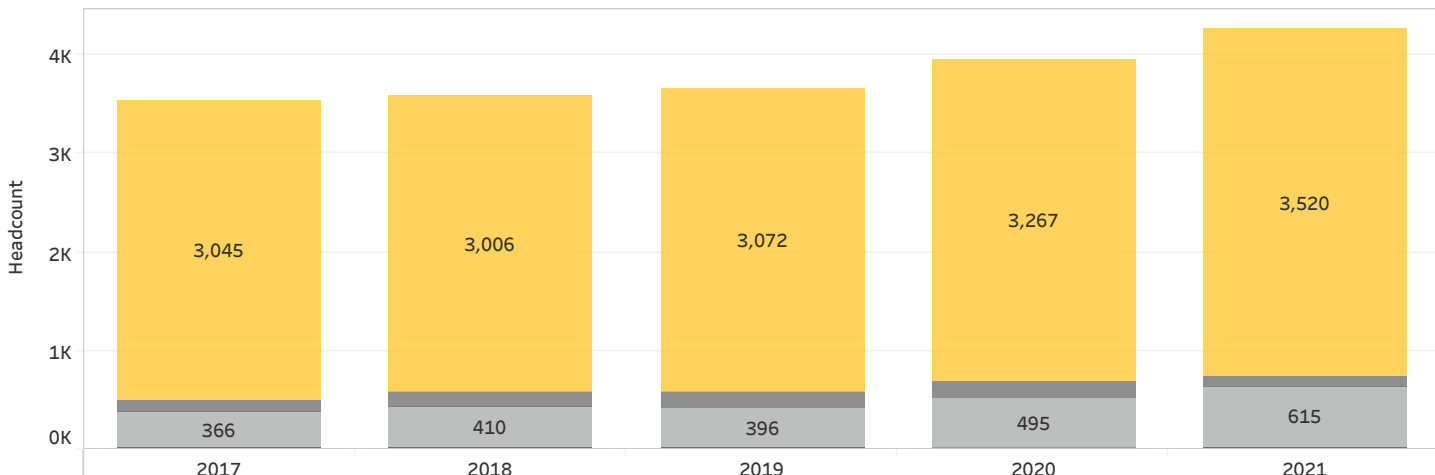


Figure 21. College of Computing and Software Engineering

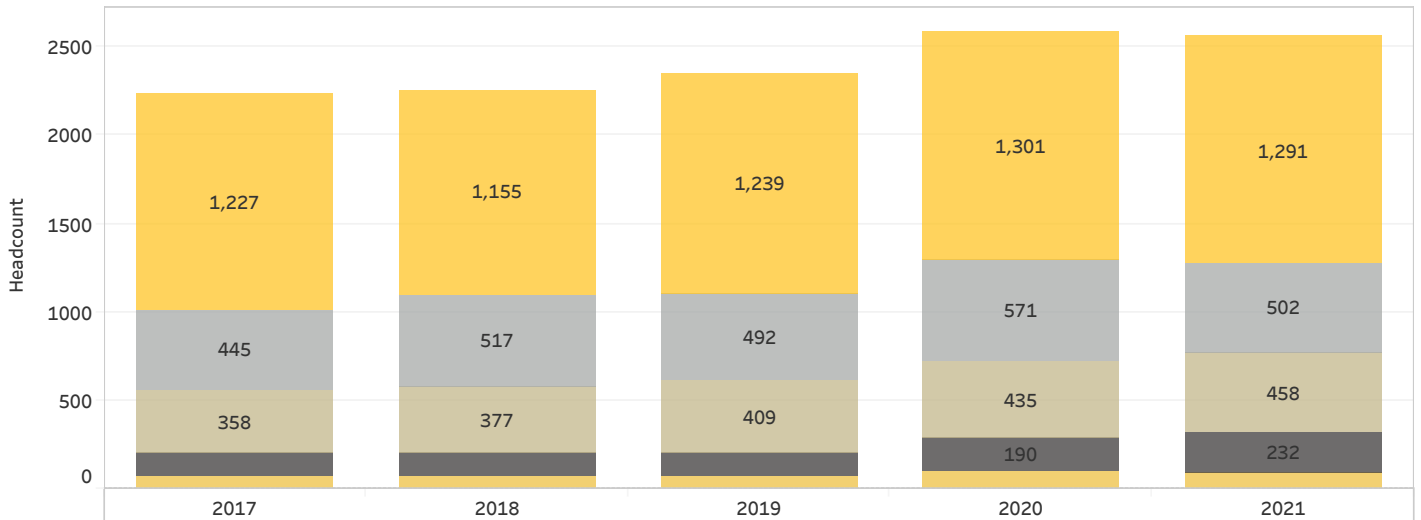


Figure 22. Bagwell College of Education

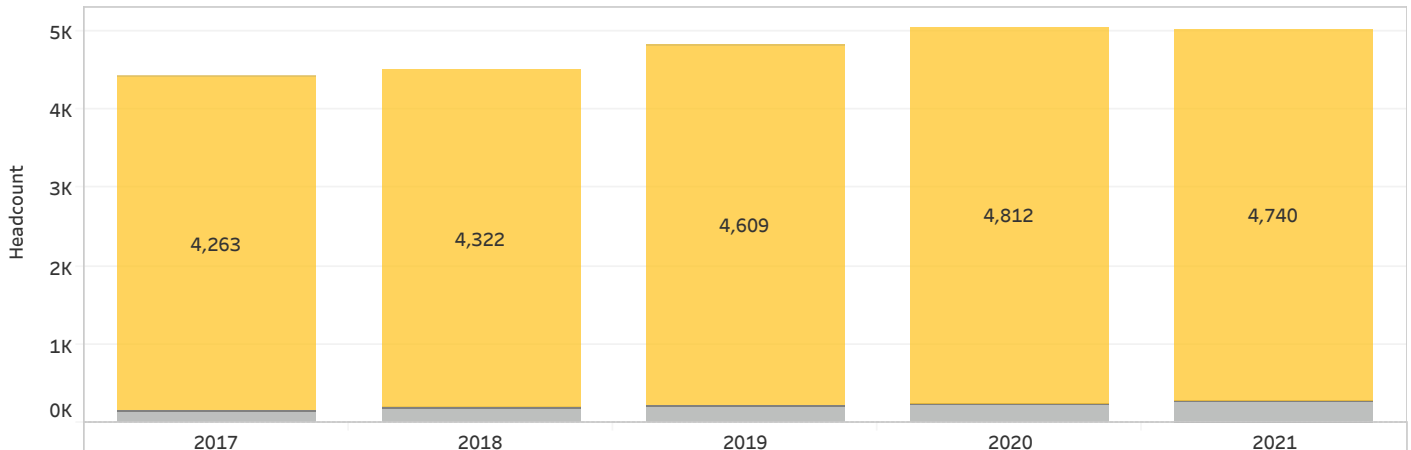


Figure 23. Southern Polytechnic College of Engineering and Engineering Technology

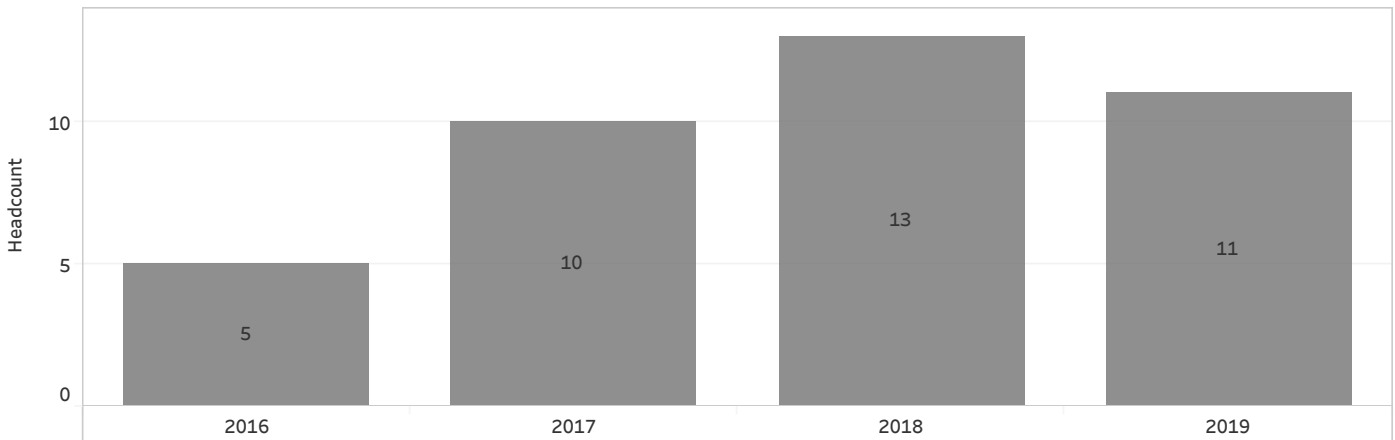


Figure 24. Graduate College

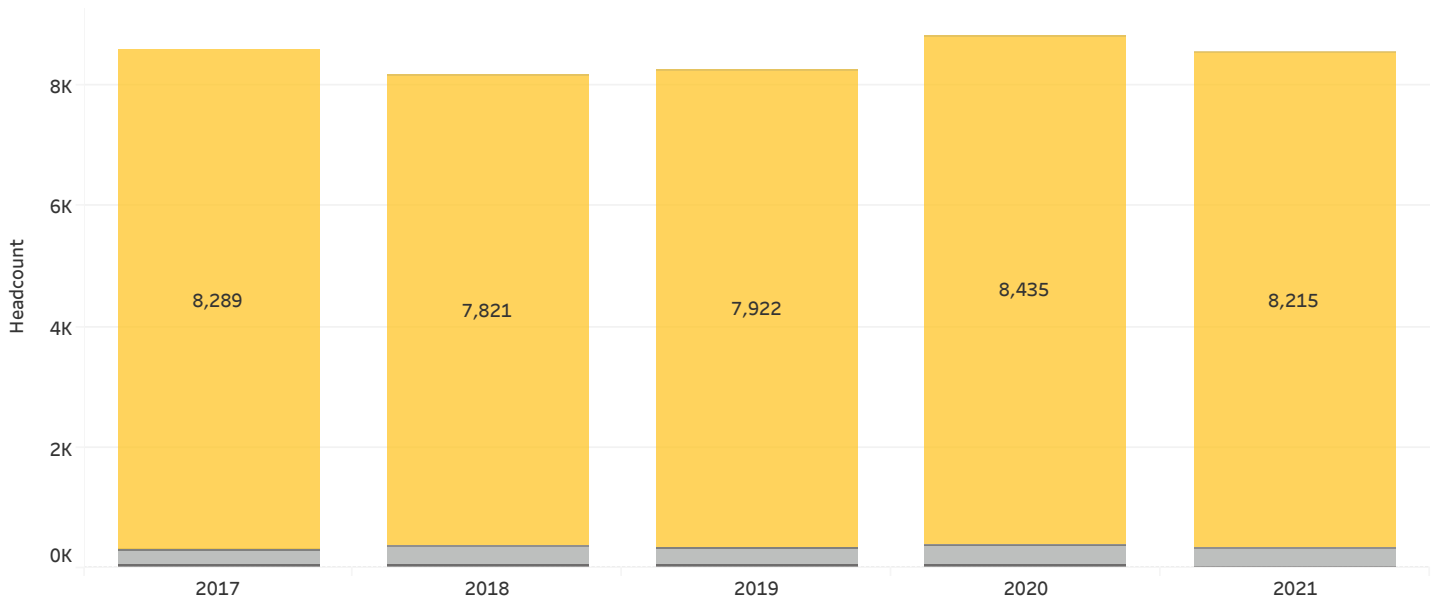


Figure 25. Radow College of Humanities and Social Sciences

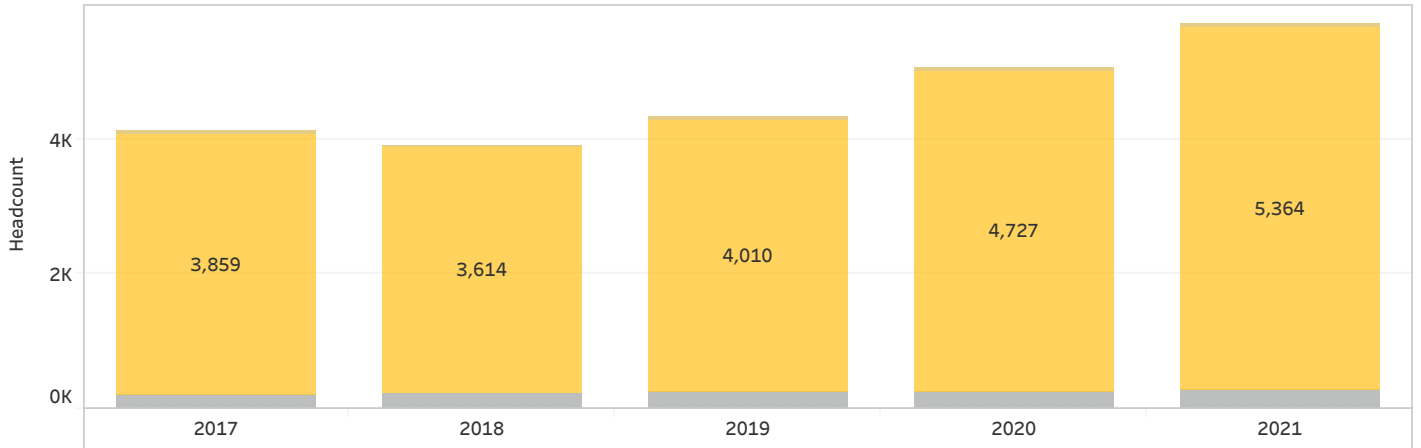


Figure 26. WellStar College of Health and Human Services

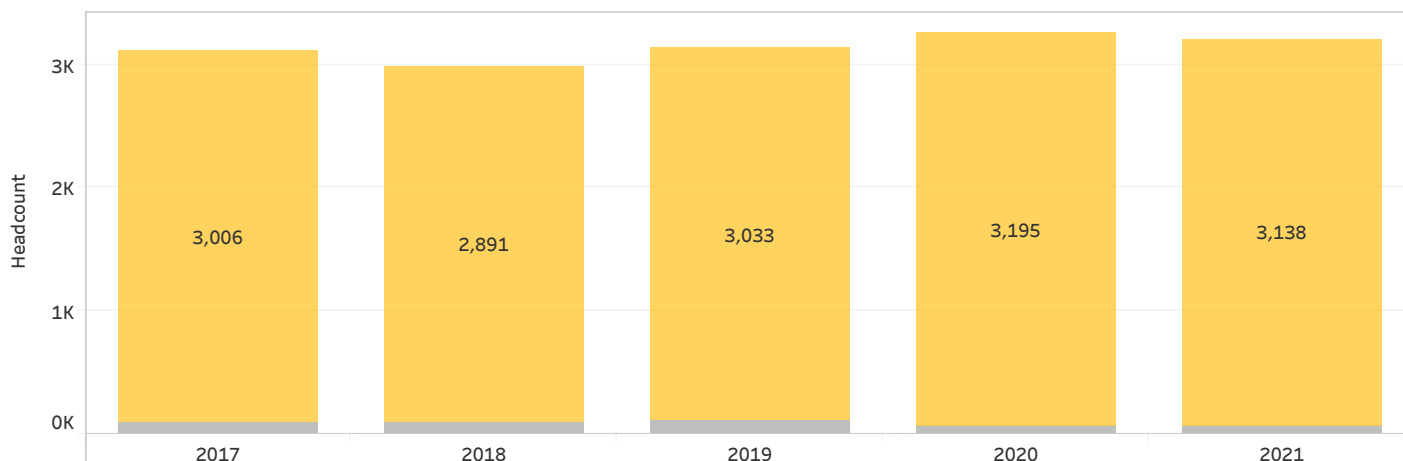


Figure 27. College of Science and Mathematics

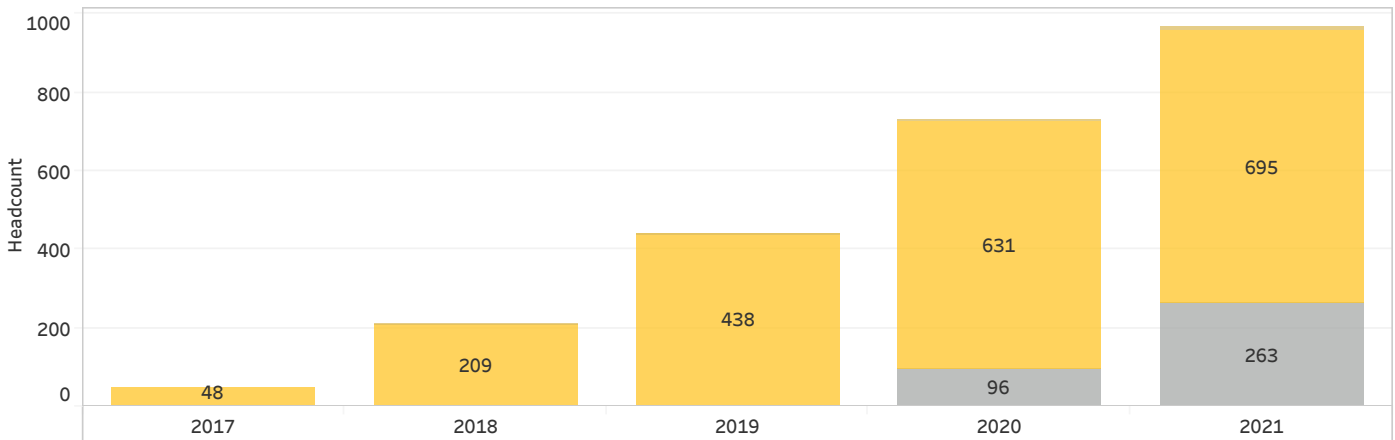


Figure 28. Institute for Cybersecurity

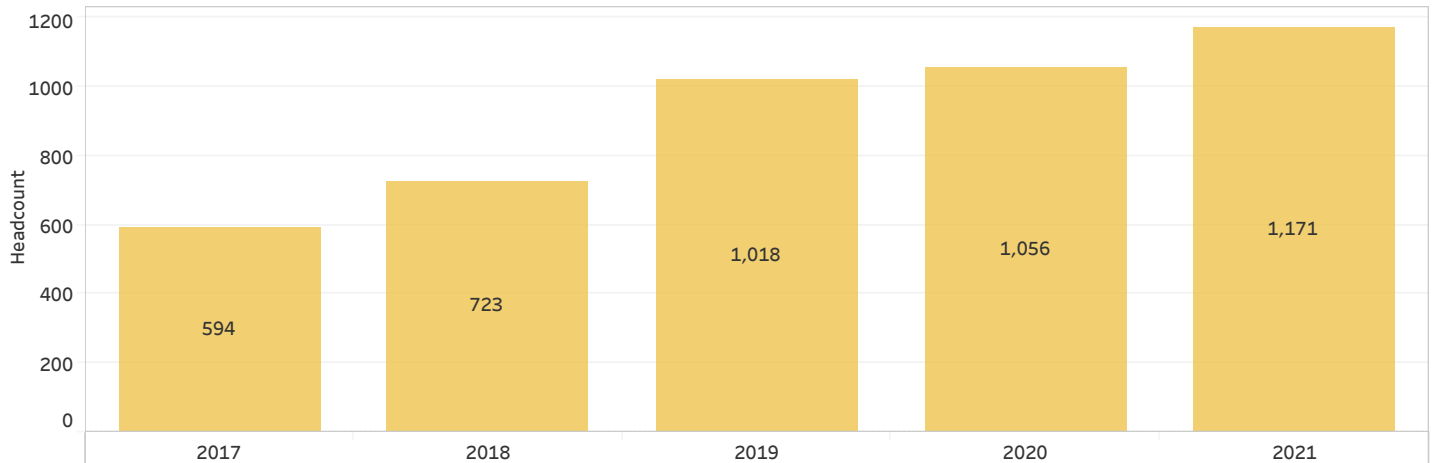


Figure 29. Other/Non-Degree Seeking

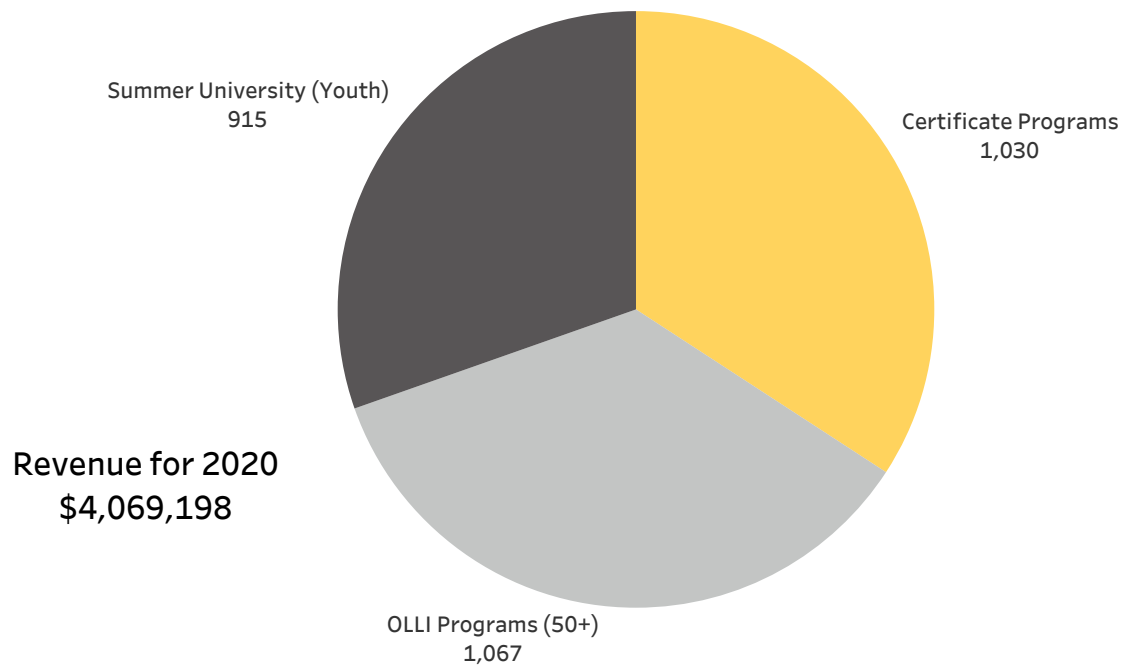


Figure 30. Continuing and Professional Education

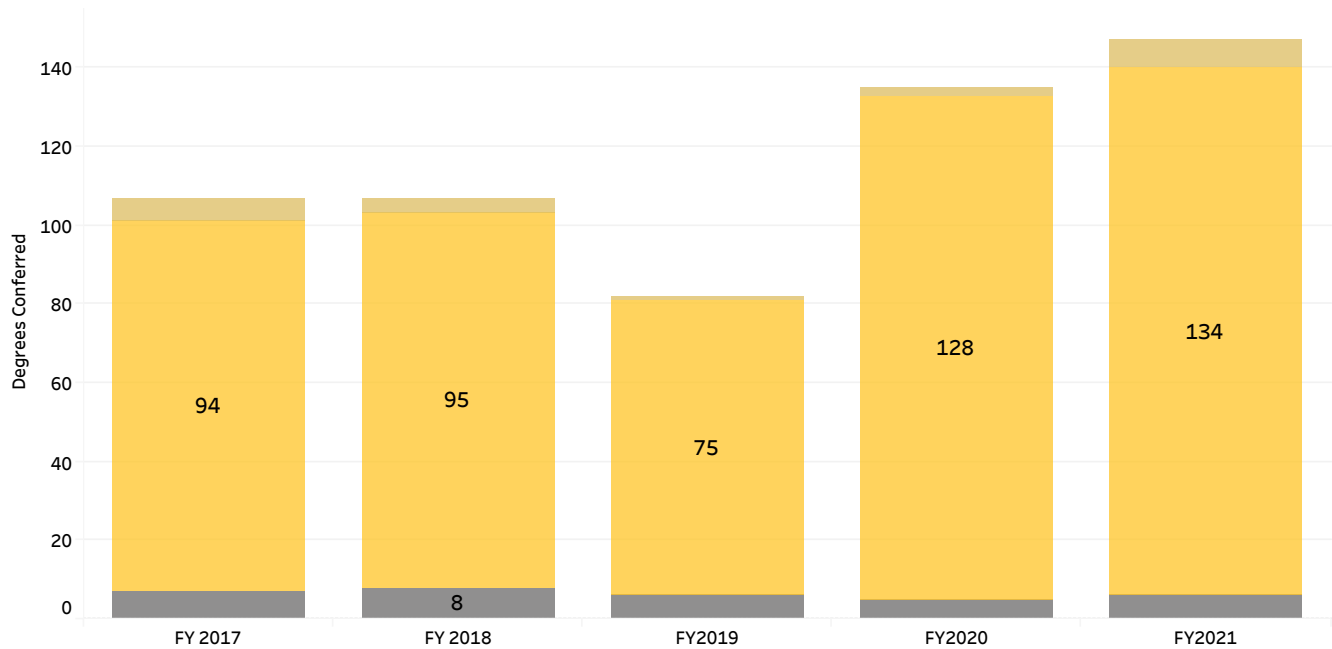


Figure 31. College of Architecture and Construction Management

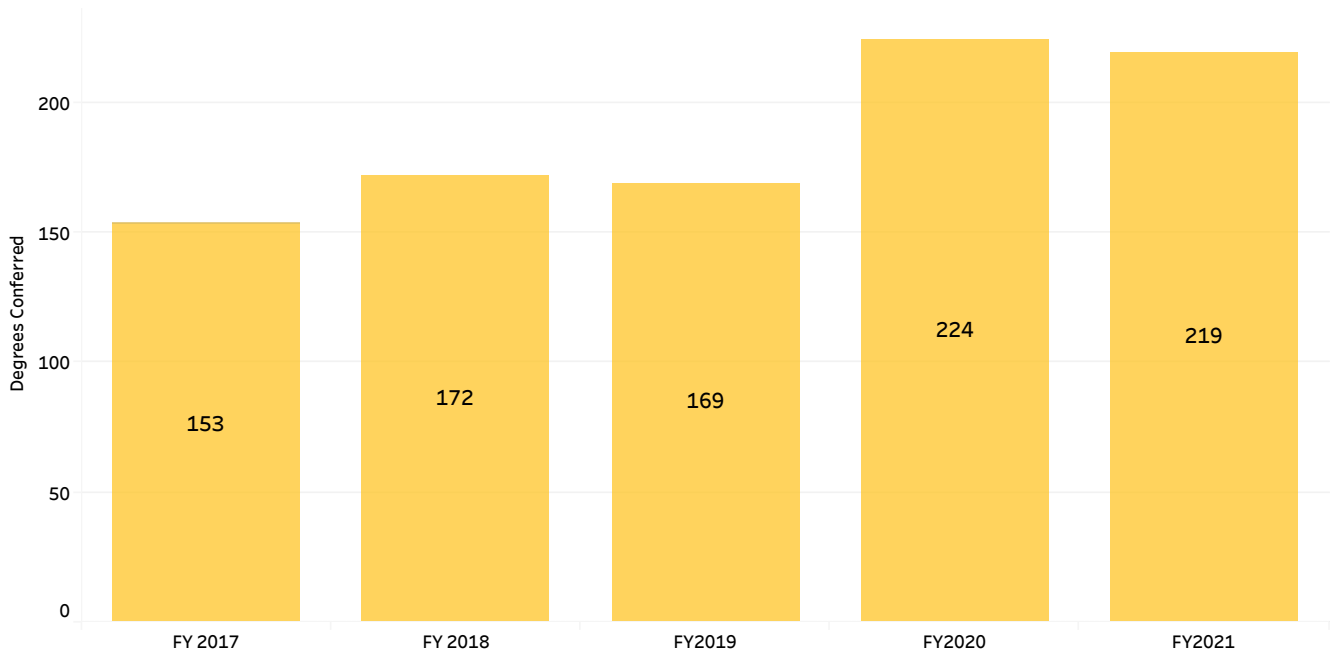


Figure 32. College of the Arts

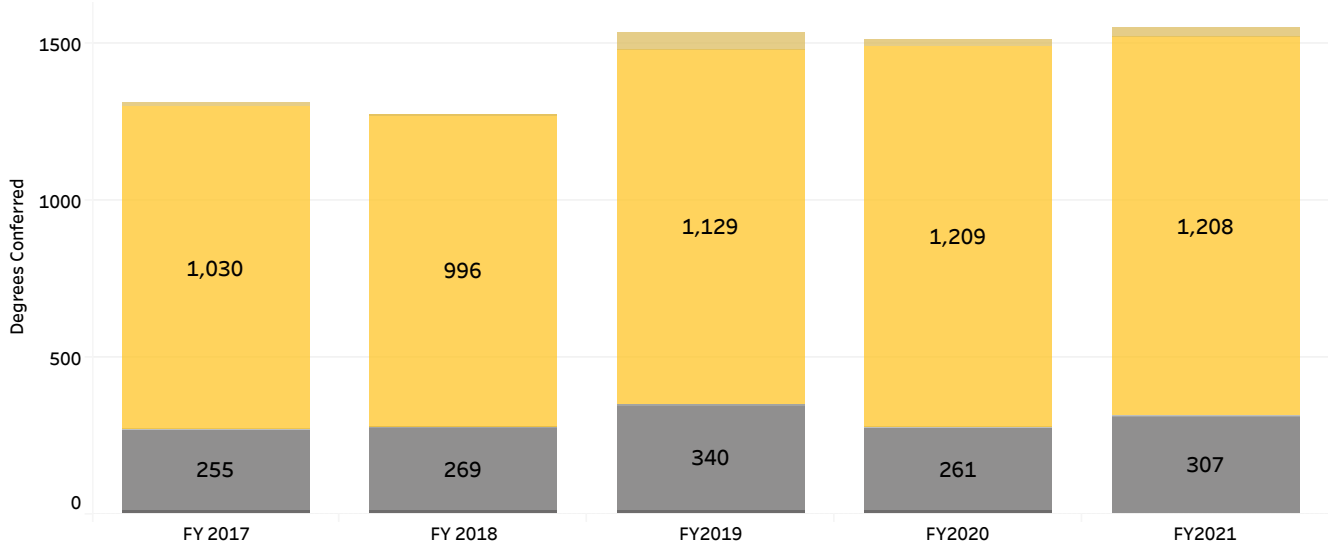


Figure 33. Coles College of Business

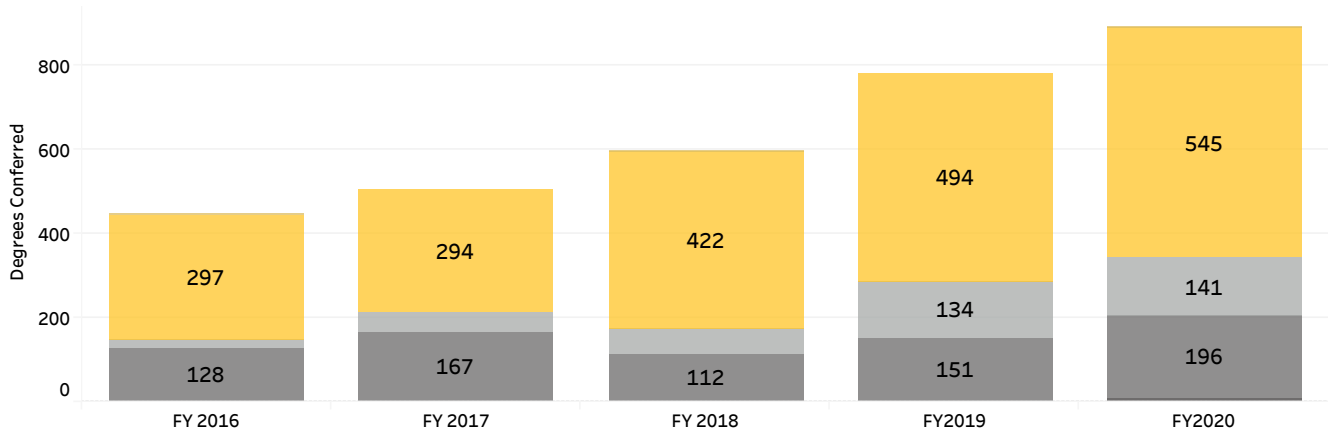


Figure 34. College of Computing and Software Engineering

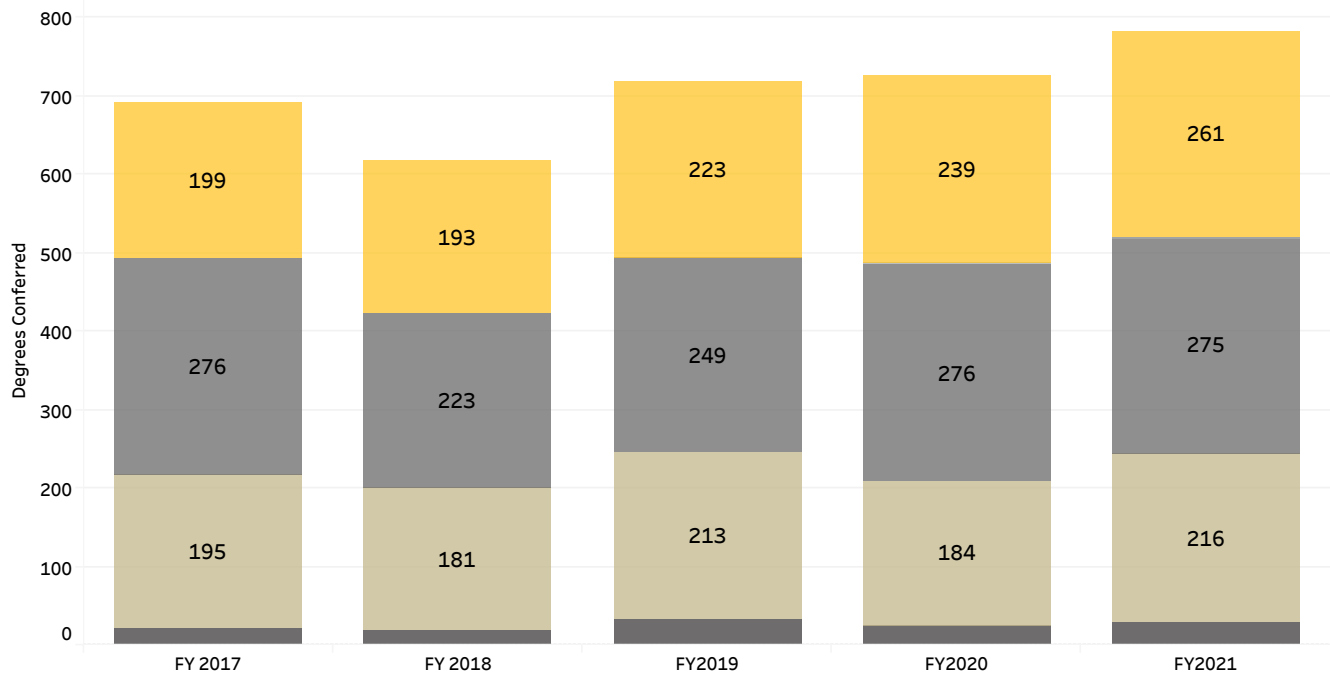


Figure 35. Bagwell College of Education

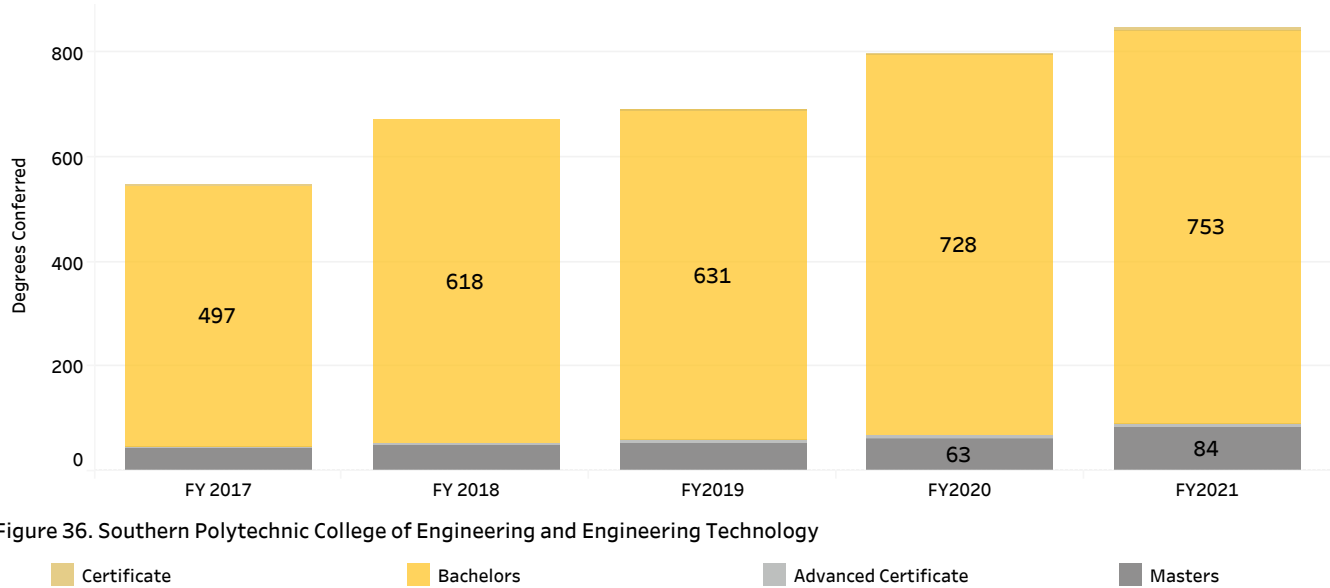


Figure 36. Southern Polytechnic College of Engineering and Engineering Technology

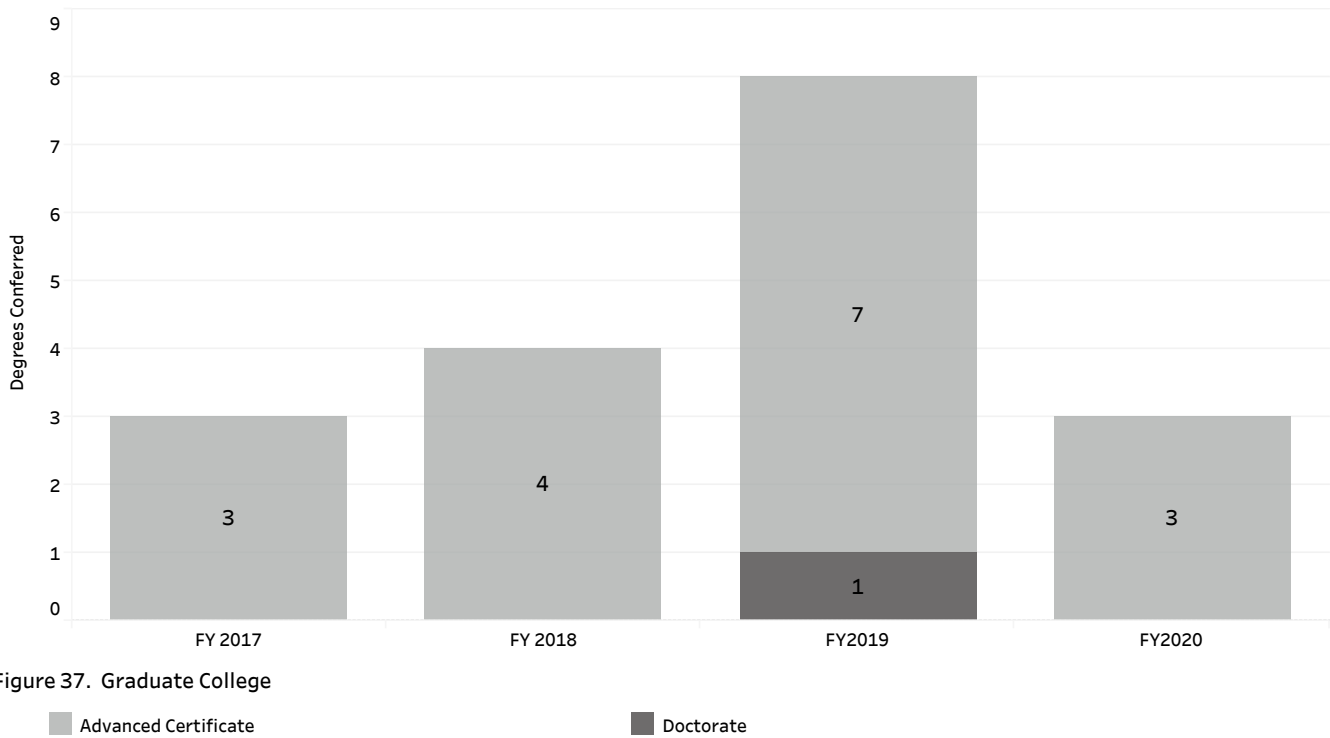


Figure 37. Graduate College

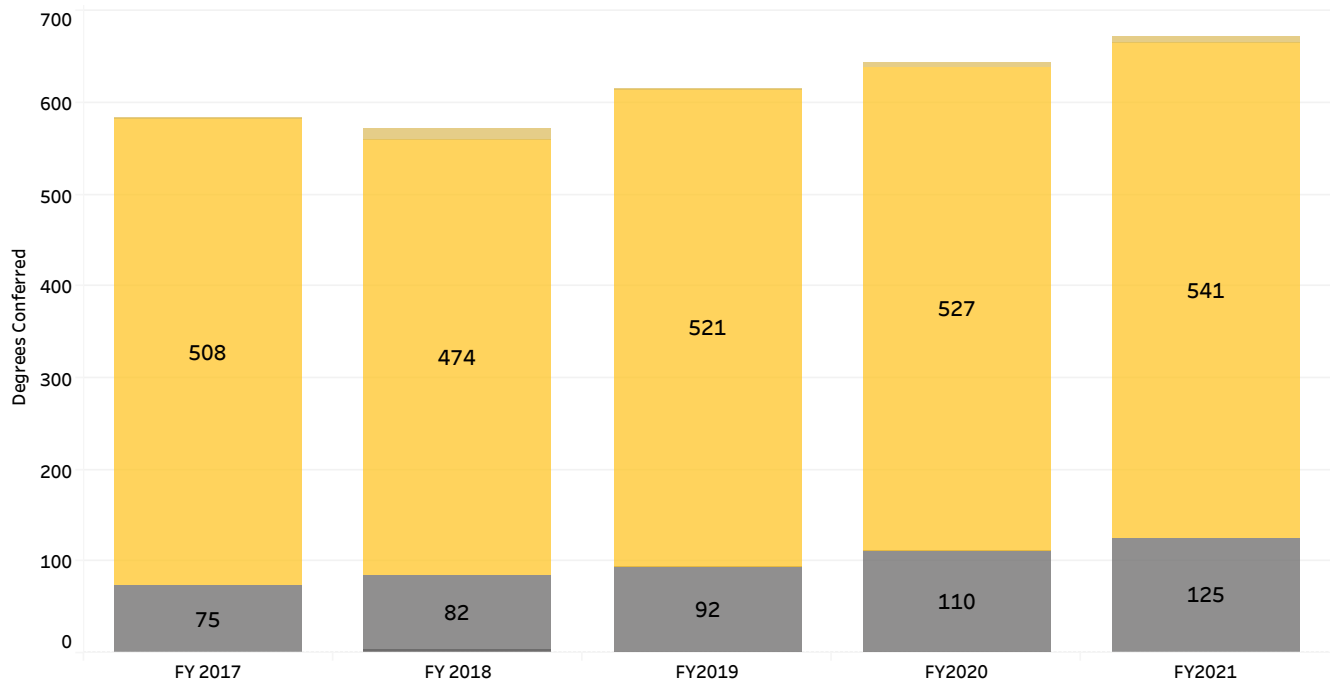


Figure 38. WellStar College of Health and Human Services

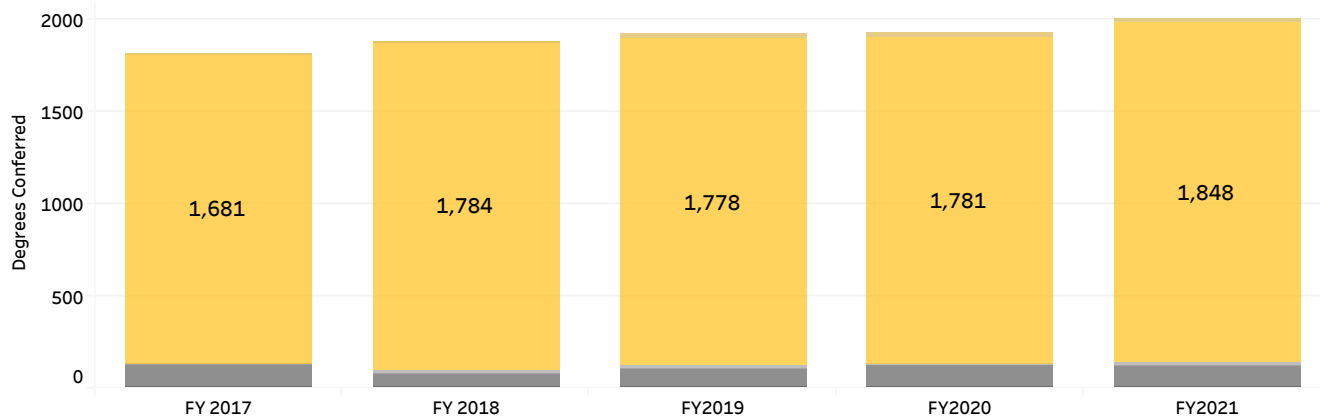


Figure 39. Radow College of Humanities and Social Sciences

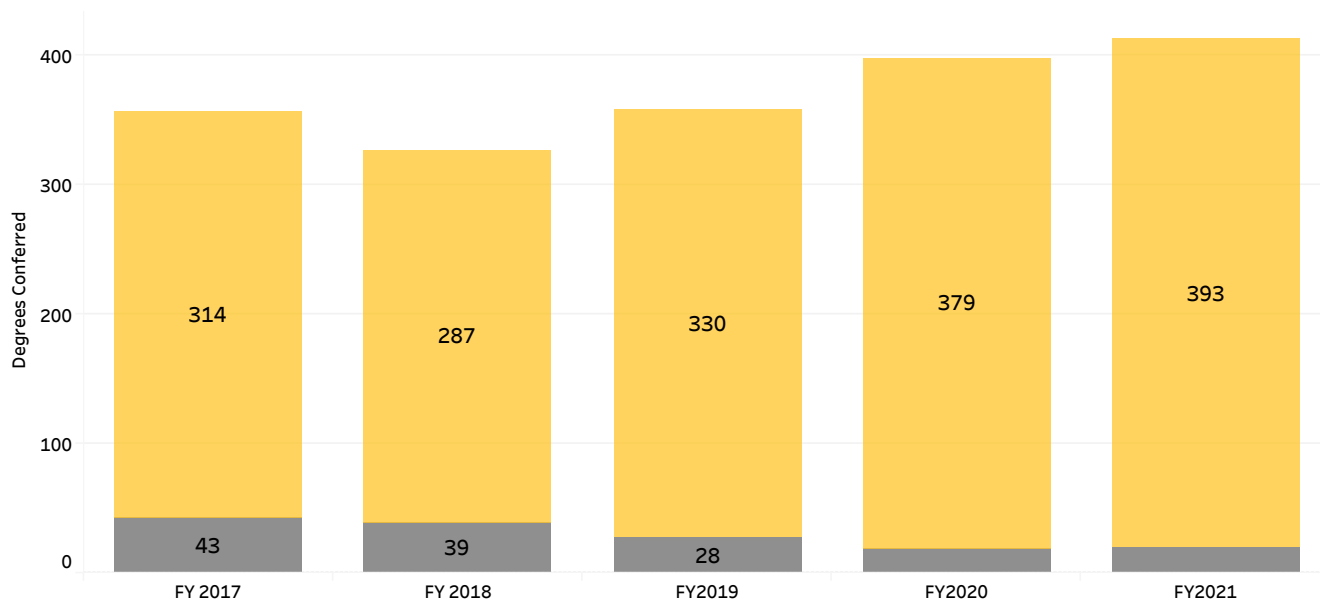


Figure 40. College of Science and Mathematics

Historic Institutional Retention and Graduation Rates

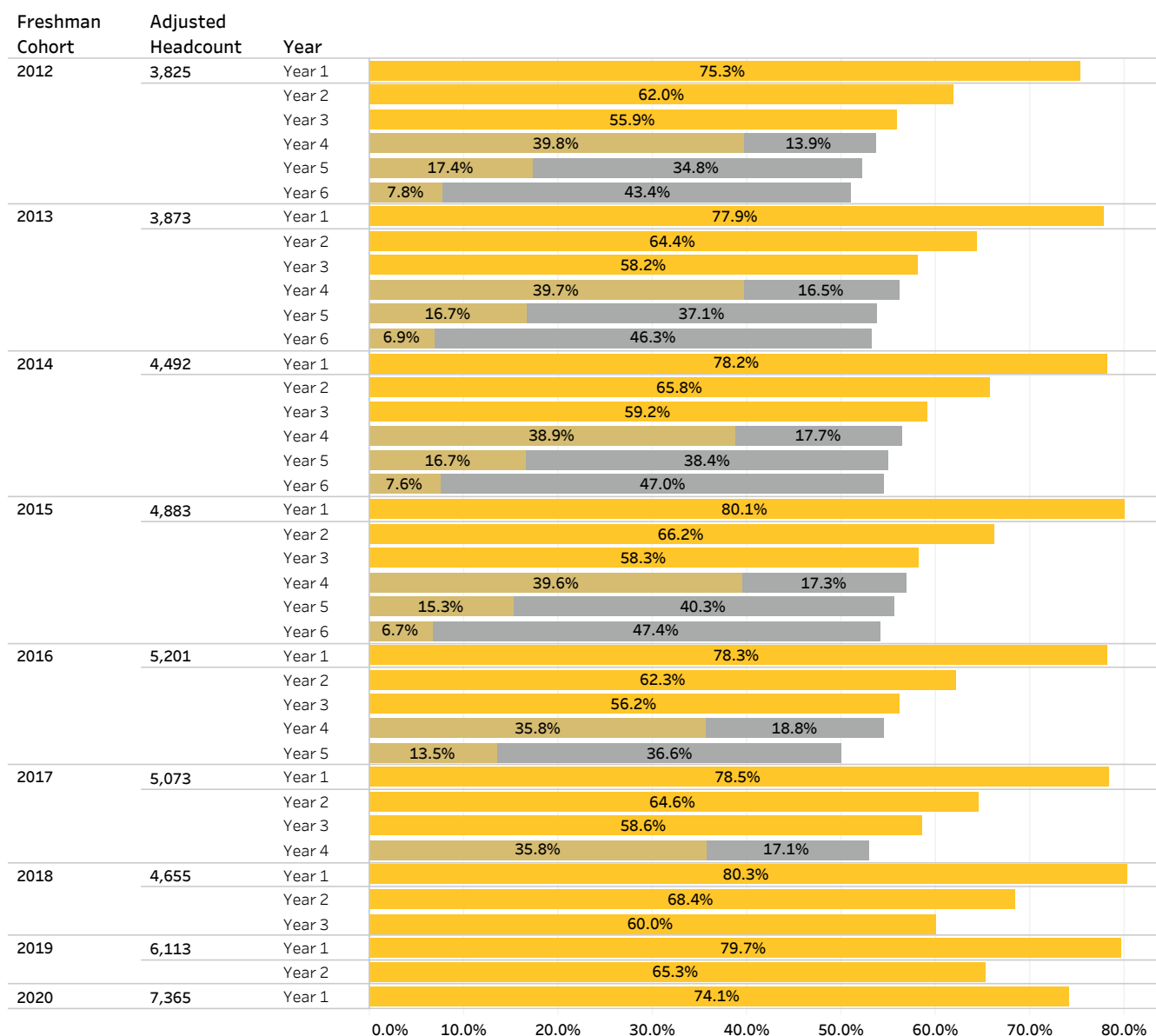


Figure 41. Historic Institutional Retention and Graduation Rates

Historic Institutional Retention and Graduation Rates Transfer Students

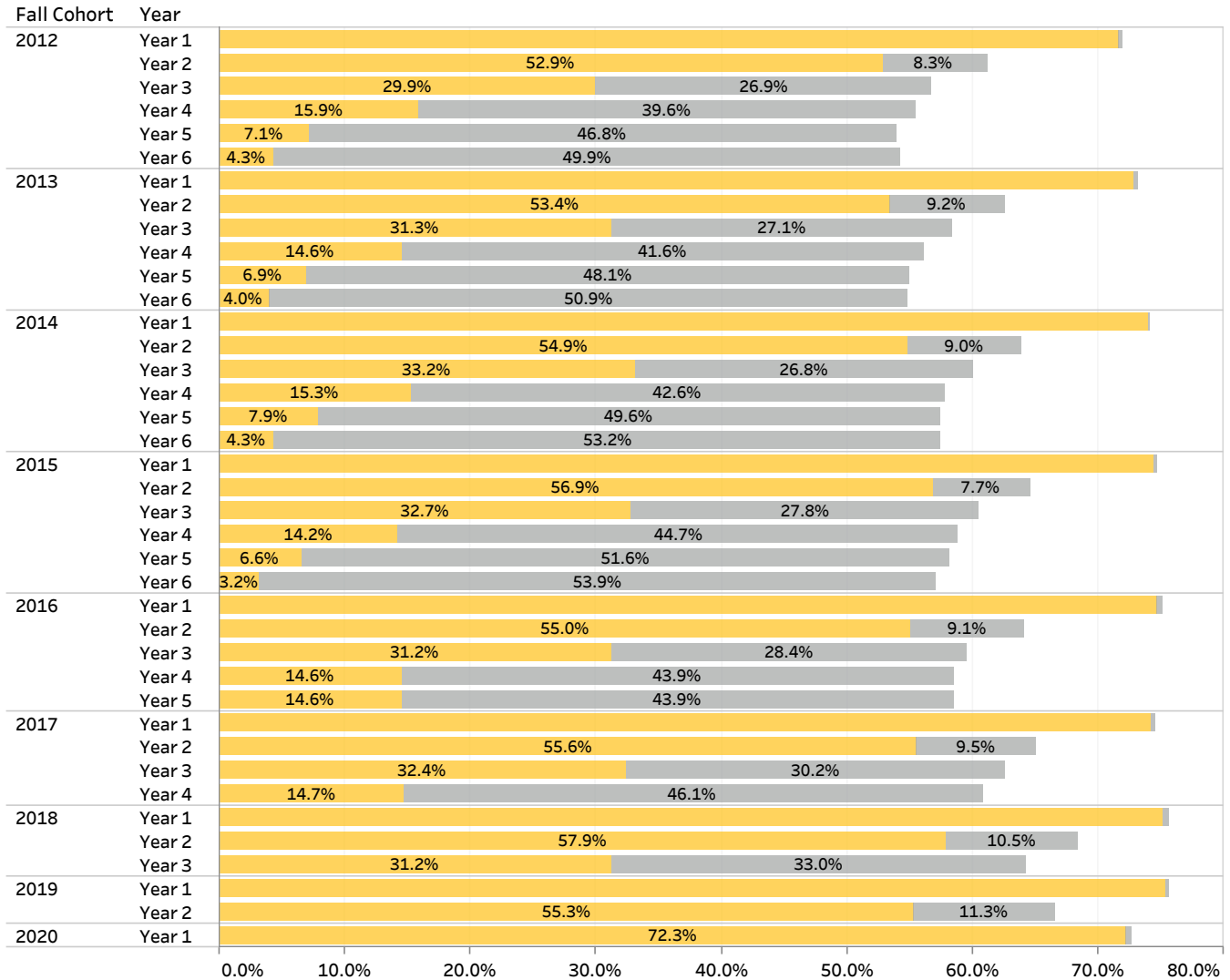


Figure 42. Historic Transfer Retention and Graduation Rates

Credit Hours Taught by Full-Time and Part-Time Faculty

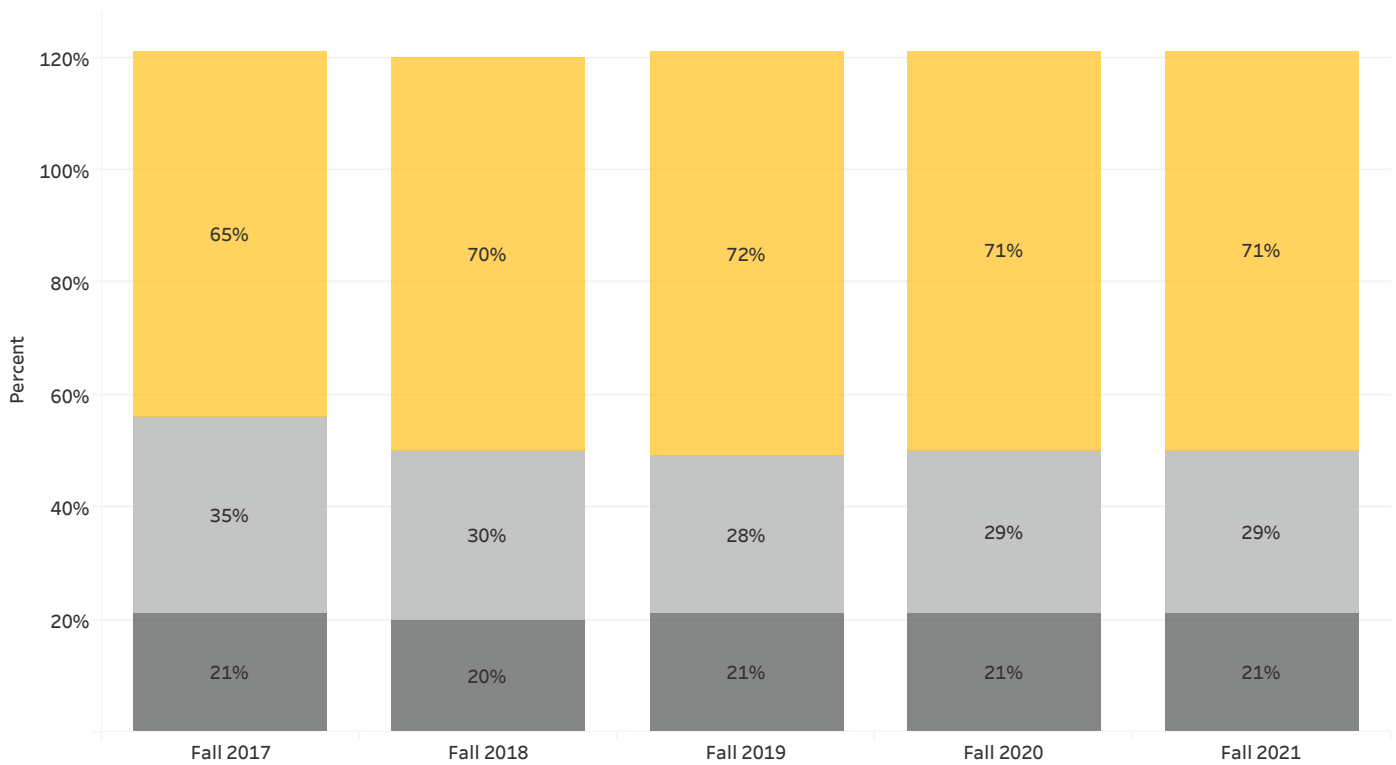


Figure 43. Percent of Credit Hours Taught by Full-Time and Part-Time Faculty

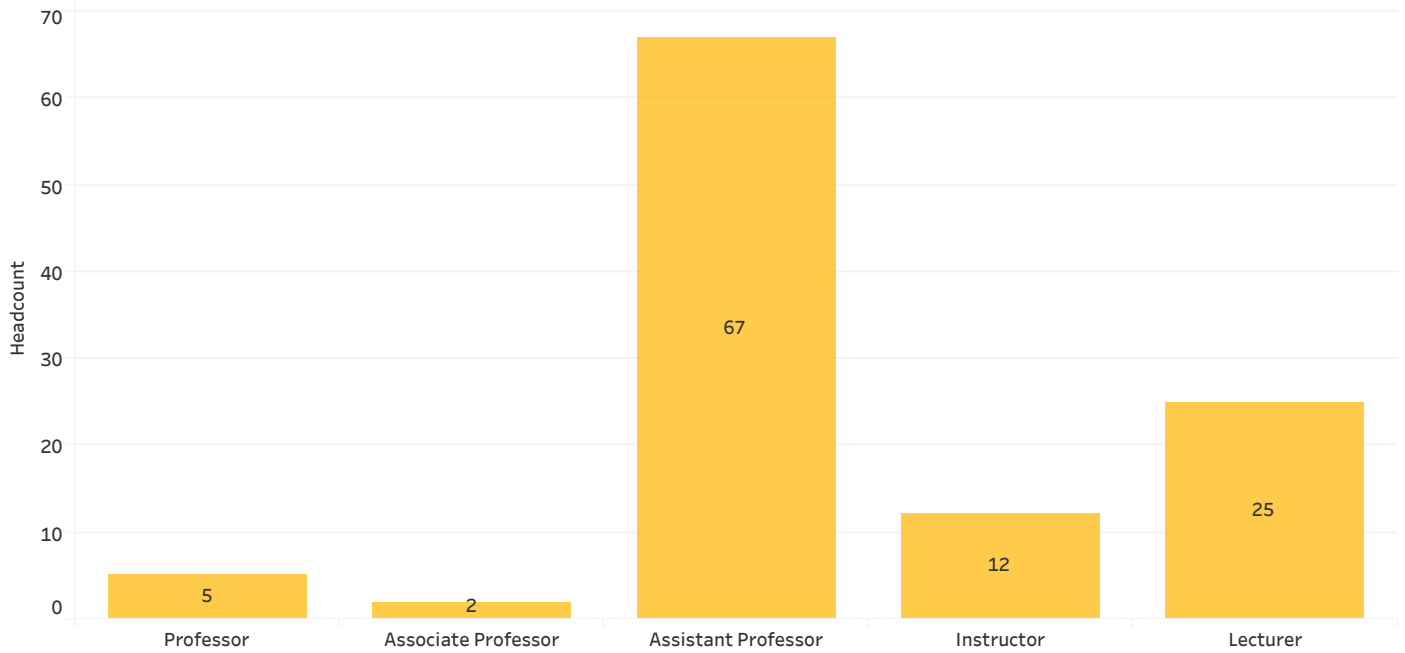


Figure 44. New Full-Time Instructional Faculty

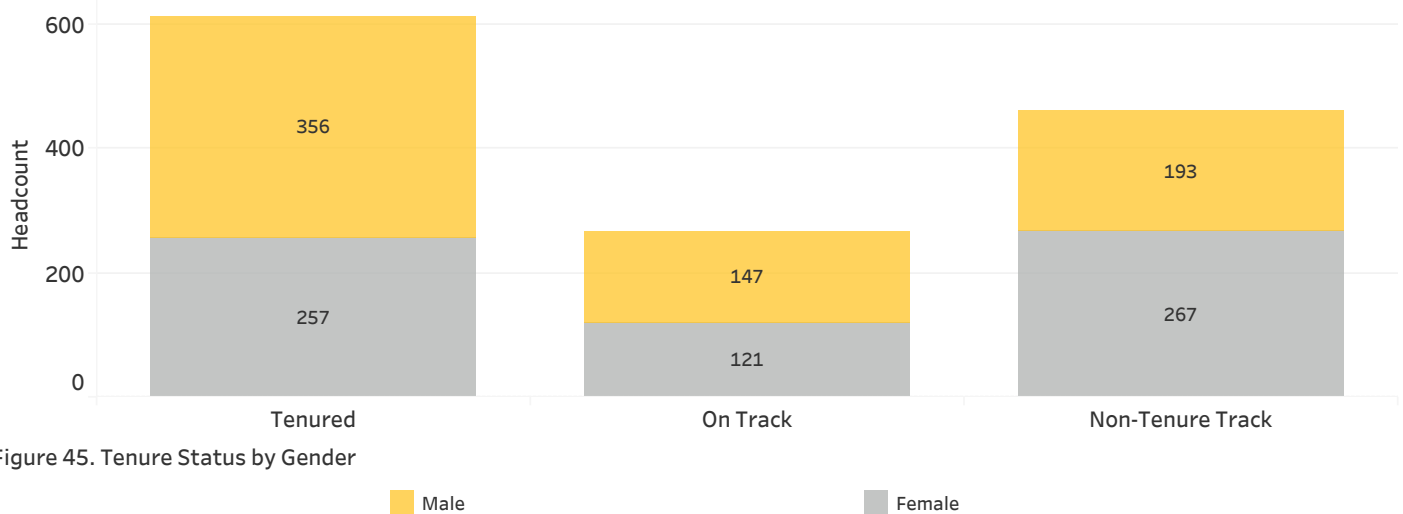


Figure 45. Tenure Status by Gender

Academic tenure is an employment status at the University that assures a tenured faculty member of continuous appointment from contract year to contract year, except under conditions of dismissal for cause (see KSU Faculty Handbook Section 4.1.9), termination or layoff of tenured personnel due to program modification (see the Board of Regents (BOR) Policy Manual 8.3.7.10), or financial exigencies. The awarding of tenure is a highly important decision through which the University incurs a major commitment to the individual faculty member well into the future. Years of service or successful annual reviews alone are not sufficient to qualify for tenure. It should only be granted to those faculty members whose achievements demonstrate the quality and significance expected of their current rank and who demonstrate potential for long-term effectiveness at the University. All tenure track faculty are expected to produce scholarship in at least one performance area. This scholarship must be consistent with departmental, college, and university guidelines. Only under exceptional circumstances will a candidate be recommended for tenure without at least one form of scholarship as articulated in approved tenure and promotion guidelines. In awarding tenure, the University recognizes the long-range value of the faculty member to the institution and ensures them the academic freedom that is essential to an atmosphere conducive to the proper operation of the University.

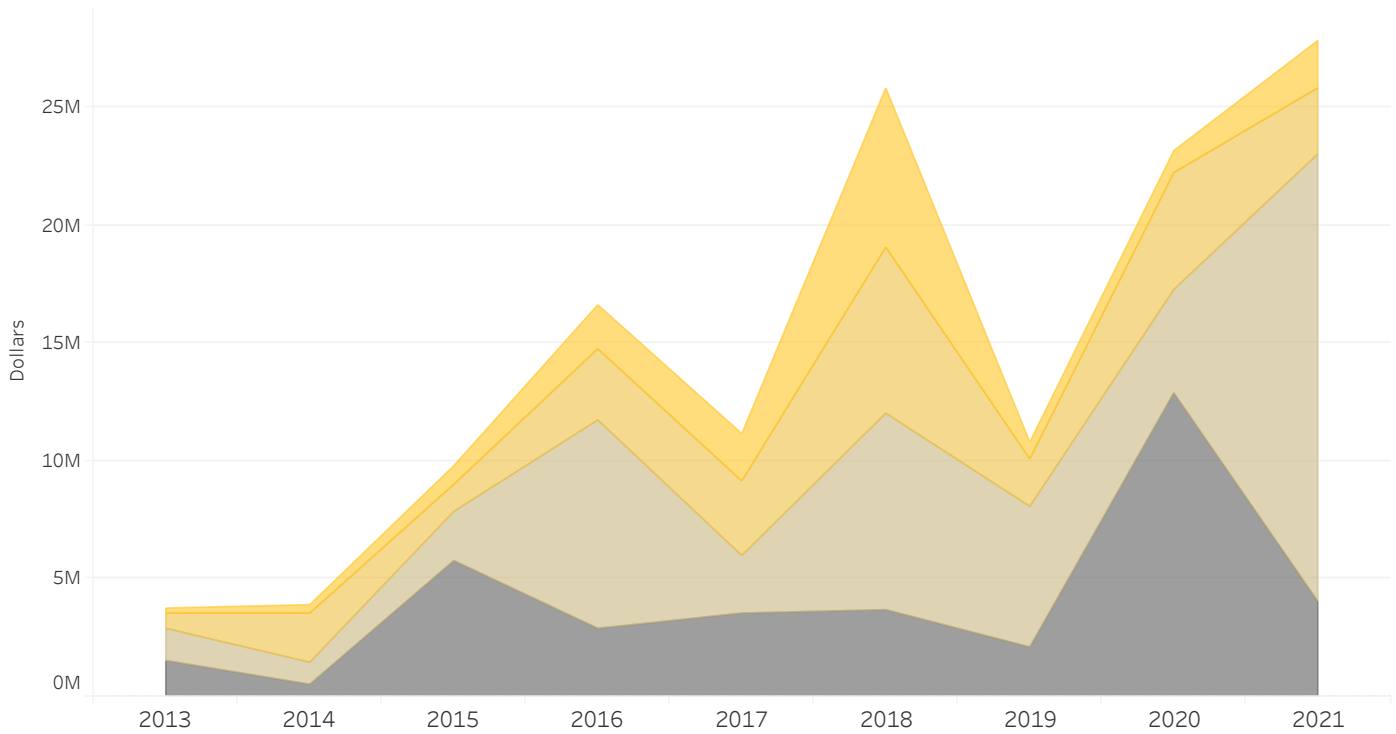


Figure 46. Charitable Giving
