President Kathy Schwaig



President Kathy Schwaig

Kathy 'Kat' Schwaig was named the sixth president of Kennesaw State University on March 16, 2022, following her tenure as interim president.

Under Schwaig's leadership as president, KSU embarked on a comprehensive student success initiative, established new graduate degrees for in-demand fields such as financial technologies (MS) and computer science (Ph.D.), formalized a targeted strategy for enrollment growth, created a dynamic campus communication plan, and impactfully invested in the University's research infrastructure. Prioritizing the cultivation of community as a strategic institutional goal, Schwaig relaunched a business incubator for campus and community innovators, created division plans to promote inclusive excellence, extended the capital campaign to include athletics, and launched FLIGHT26, an engagement program for first-year students.

From 2019-2021, Schwaig served as provost and senior vice president for academic affairs at KSU. During her time as provost, she facilitated the transition to a formal research (R2) institution and developed the R2 Roadmap to enhance undergraduate and graduate education as well as research. Schwaig led an extensive faculty hiring initiative, launched the Double Owl program, expanded the KSU Journey Honors College,

and established the Provost Leadership Fellows and the Women's Leadership Academy.

Prior to serving as provost, Schwaig was the dean of the Michael J. Coles College of Business, where she was named the Dinos Eminent Scholar Chair of Entrepreneurial Management. Schwaig oversaw the creation of the College's first doctoral program, increased educational opportunities for entrepreneurs, and achieved the top ranking in the state for the College's MBA programs.

Schwaig is a professor of information systems where her research focused on the strategic and ethical implications of computer technology. She published in key academic journals in her field, including the Journal of Management Information Systems and Information Systems Research.

Schwaig received the Oscar Burnett Award for Distinguished Achievement in Business from the Morris Brown College Foundation, the Cobb Executive Women's Glass Ceiling Award, and Atlanta Magazine's Women Making a Mark Award.

She serves on the Executive Committee for the Board of Directors of the Cobb Chamber of Commerce and on the Board of Directors for the Metro Atlanta Chamber of Commerce. She previously served on boards for the Cobb Community Foundation, Mount Paran Christian School, Children's Healthcare of Atlanta - Cobb County, Junior Achievement of Georgia, Engage Scholarship Consortium, and the Alliance for Children Everywhere.

A native of central Texas, Schwaig earned a BBA in Accounting and an MBA in Information Systems from Baylor University, a Master of Liberal Arts from Johns Hopkins University, and a Ph.D. in Information Systems from the University of South Carolina.

Schwaig is the proud mom of her middle school daughter, Emma Grace.

Kennesaw State University Highlights 2023-2024

• Kennesaw State experienced another record enrollment, topping more than 45,000 undergraduate and graduate students. This is the fifth consecutive year that enrollment has grown at Georgia's third-largest university.

• KSU increased its undergraduate enrollment by 4.1% and graduate enrollment by 7%. The University also welcomed more than 8,600 new freshmen and freshman transfer students, a 15.7% increase over the previous year.

• Reflecting Georgia's diverse population, KSU's number of first-generation students – those who have parents or guardians who did not attain a four-year college degree – increased by 5% and represent more than a third of the total student body (38.3%).

• Kennesaw State's endowment has grown to \$94 million, doubling from \$47 million five years ago.

• KSU launched the public phase of The Campaign for Kennesaw State, the most ambitious fundraising effort in the University's history. The campaign goal was increased to \$200 million following the success of the private phase, which raised nearly \$120 million.

• Construction began on an interdisciplinary STEM building on the Marietta Campus. Scheduled to be completed in Fall 2025, the 70,000-square-foot facility will advance collaborative research and teaching in science, technology, engineering and mathematics.

• The renovated Recreation and Wellness Center on the Marietta Campus opened, offering additional recreation space and amenities in a more energy-efficient building.

• The Board of Regents of the University System of Georgia approved a Master of Science in Artificial Intelligence degree program for KSU, beginning in Fall 2024.

• Kennesaw State University's online programs were ranked among the best in the nation by U.S. News & World Report in its "2024 Best Online Programs" and "2024 Best Online Programs for Veterans."

• The University Professional and Continuing Education Association recognized Kennesaw State with the 2024 UPCEA Strategic Innovation in Online Education Award, for KSU's course quality management model that ensures high-quality standards for online and hybrid courses.

• KSU was designated a Military Friendly School for creating sustainable and meaningful education paths for the military community.

• Karin Scarpinato was named vice president for research, overseeing KSU's Office of Research and leading all research endeavors within the University.

• Accomplished researcher and physiologist Heather Koopman was appointed as the new dean of the College of Science and Mathematics.

• Biomedical engineering assistant professor Paul Lee received a grant from the National Institutes of Health to advance his work to develop an affordable device that determines the risk of stroke for children with sickle cell disease.

• Biochemistry professor Carol Chrestensen was awarded a National Institutes of Health grant to further study protein and enzyme binding that could be the key to understanding and preventing cardiovascular disease and cancer.

• KSU received a National Institutes of Health grant for a five-year renewal of the Peach State Bridges to Doctorate program, which provides master's students from underrepresented communities the support they need to pursue doctoral degrees in biomedical sciences.

• Associate professor of optical physics Jianming Wen is utilizing a National Science Foundation grant to develop a new form of computing that is faster and more secure than today's best supercomputers.

• With a National Science Foundation grant, professors from computer science and mathematics education are introducing calculus concepts to students earlier in high school to help them succeed in college, particularly in STEM fields.

• Computer science associate professor Ramazan S. Aygun was selected for the National Science Foundation's prestigious Trusted CI (Cyberinfrastructure) Fellows program, which provides advanced training to some of the nation's top scientific cybersecurity experts.

• Mechanical engineering student Derek Price II was awarded a Barry M. Goldwater scholarship, presented each year to the nation's top undergraduate scholars in the sciences, mathematics and engineering.

• Kennesaw State celebrated its 10th cohort of Birla Carbon Scholars, an intensive summer program for College of Science and Mathematics students to apply their studies toward sponsored research projects under the guidance of KSU faculty experts.

• Computer science major Yemi Agesin won first place at Apple's Worldwide Developers Conference in a competition that tasked students with creating an original app using the Swift coding language.

• The Academic Learning Center, home to student honors and research facilities, was named the Morgan and Bailey Academic Learning Center in honor of the University's largest family benefactors, Audrey Morgan and her late sister Bobbie Bailey.

• Kennesaw State University was recognized by the National Security Agency's National Centers of Academic Excellence in Cybersecurity as the top institution in the U.S. for demonstrating cybersecurity best practices in its community, developing cybersecurity programs and faculty, and empowering students to pursue careers in the industry.

• Kennesaw State Athletics officially joins Conference USA for all sports in 2024. With that move, the KSU football program elevates to the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS).

• KSU's Executive Master of Business Administration again was rated as the best in Georgia and among the top in the world, according to CEO Magazine's annual Global Executive MBA rankings.

• For the fifth year in a row, the Joel A. Katz Music and Entertainment Business program (MEBUS) was ranked among the world's best music business programs in Billboard magazine's Top Music Business Schools report.

A Brief History of Kennesaw State University By Dr. Thomas Scott, Campus Historian



In the generation following World War II a host of forces (including the popularity of the GI Bill and a doubling of average family income) brought about a democratization of higher education, as colleges became more accessible to working class families. Georgia joined the national trend in creating a host of new institutions. With a burgeoning Georgia economy, Georgia Tech in 1948 opened a two-year branch at the old Naval Air Station in Chamblee. It took the name Southern Tech and offered practical, hands-on training in engineering technology. In 1961 the Board of Regents moved the school to Marietta. It prospered in the new location and, following a nationwide trend, became a four-year school in 1970. Ten years later in 1980, it split away from Georgia Tech as a separate unit of the University System.

Meanwhile, local leaders took note that Cobb was the largest county in Georgia without a liberal arts college. Their lobbying efforts persuaded the Board of Regents in 1963 to charter Kennesaw Junior College. The first students enrolled in September 1966, but because the Kennesaw campus was not ready in time, the first quarter was held in several designated classrooms on the Southern Tech campus.

For several decades, the two schools followed parallel paths. Kennesaw gained four-year status in 1976. In 1984 the Board of Regents approved Kennesaw's first MBA and M.Ed. programs. The following year the board awarded Southern Tech its first master's degree in Technology Management. Both schools gained university status in 1996. However, Kennesaw's enrollment increasingly outstripped its Cobb County neighbor. Due to dynamic growth in the Betty Siegel era, Kennesaw State by fall 1990 had 10,030 students, more than twice as large as Southern Tech's 4,018.

By fall 2013 Kennesaw was four times larger than Southern Polytechnic State University (24,629, compared to 6,549). In that year, in a cost-saving move during a national recession, the Board of Regents voted to merge the two schools under the name Kennesaw State University and under the direction of KSU President Dan Papp. The consolidation became official in January 2015. With 35,420 students in fall 2018 KSU was the 3rd largest university in Georgia and one of the 50 largest colleges and universities in the country. Kennesaw today offers more than 150 degree programs and has over 100,000 alumni.

The Kennesaw State University Archives was established in 2004 and is housed within the Department of Museums, Archives and Rare Books. Archivists use the collections of institutional records to connect and educate students about the value of primary sources and to serve as a hub for KSU's organizational and historical memory.



Transfer Student Admissions





Comparisons of Undergraduate Transfer Students from USG and Non-USG Institutions Fiscal Years 2019-2023



New Student Enrollment Trend






Enrollment by College Fall 2023



Enrollment Trend by Gender



Total Enrollment by Race and Ethnicity




Figure 8. Race and Ethnicity Trend by Fall Semesters










Figure 11. International Student Enrollment	Figure 11.	International	Student	Enrollment




Figure 24. Graduate College




Figure 25. Radow College of Humanities and Social Sciences & Radow College of Humanities and Social Sciences








Figure 30. Continuing and Professional Education






Figure 38. College of Health & Hum Ser & WellStar College of Health and Human Services








Figure 44. New Full-Time Instructional Faculty




Figure 45. Tenure Status by Gender

Academic tenure is an employment status at the University that assures a tenured faculty member of continuous appointment from contract year to contract year, except under conditions of dismissal for cause (see KSU Faculty Handbook Section 4.1.9), termination or layoff of tenured personnel due to program modification (see the Board of Regents (BOR) Policy Manual 8.3.7.10), or financial exigencies. The awarding of tenure is a highly important decision through which the University incurs a major commitment to the individual faculty member well into the future. Years of service or successful annual reviews alone are not sufficient to qualify for tenure. It should only be granted to those faculty members whose achievements demonstrate the quality and significance expected of their current rank and who demonstrate potential for long-term effectiveness at the University. All tenure track faculty are expected to produce scholarship in at least one performance area. This scholarship must be consistent with departmental, college, and university guidelines. Only under exceptional circumstances will a candidate be recommended for tenure without at least one form of scholarship as articulated in approved tenure and promotion guidelines. In awarding tenure, the University recognizes the long-range value of the faculty member to the institution and ensures them the academic freedom that is essential to an atmosphere conducive to the proper operation of the University.


